Mr. Geow argued that in cases of this nature a wife could not testify against her husband. The judge took this point into consideration.

HAVE LOADED 17 AT CITY'S POTATOSHED

Change May Be Necessary With Boston Boat Season Starting

A very successful season at the city potato warehouse, since late last fall, was reported this morning by Commissioner Bullock. He said that already 17 steamers had been loaded there, another shipload was in shed in readiness for shipment and he had been given to understand shipments would be continued until along in June.

When the work of building the shed was undertaken the C. N. R. agreed to lease it from the city and gave a guarantee that not fewer than 15 steamers would be loaded each season.

The commissioner said that arrangements would have to be made to accommodate the steamers loading at this warehouse for the balance of the season by moving them up to the Fettingill wharf as the Empress would have to come back to her own dock on May 10, the Eastern Steamship Boston service starting on that date. During the winter months the Empress has used the Eastern S. S. dock.
