ford and Asquith has been defeated in his candidacy for the Chancellorship of Oxford University, a post made vacant through the death of Lord Curzon of Kedleston.

It appeared that the Liberal leader in the House of Lords, notwithstanding his political leanings, would have a walkover. Quite recently, however, to the surprise of the general public, a new candidate appeared in Viscount Cave, Lord High Chancellor, and in the polling today Lord Cave won the victory with 987 votes against 441 for the Earl of Oxford.
