POSTON WARNS CANADA OF ANNEXATION

SAYS OCEAN FREIGHTS MUST BE ADJUSTED

Predicts Question Big Federal Election Issue

HAS GOOD NEWS

Says British Capitalists Are Now Prepared to Do Something

QUEBEC, Aug. 8.—The outstanding question in the next Federal election will be ocean rates, declared W. H. R. Preston, who arrived here yesterday on board the Meftis.

"Canada has to do something about ocean rates, and the only thing that can seriously fight the North Atlantic dominion is the Petersen contract," he added.

The problem had to be solved, Mr. Preston said, because if it were not Canadian manufacturers would start negotiations with the United States to market their produce there.

The question of ocean rates was of vital interest, not only to Canadian, but also to British manufacturers, Mr. Preston stated. He knew some British exporters who shipped their products to Hamburg, and from that point to Canada, obtaining there a lower rate than by shipping direct from England to this country.

FEARS ANNEXATION.

"I am sure that the United States is a market it would soon bring Canada to annexation by the republic, he said. Questioned as to the Petersen contract, Mr. Preston replied: "I cannot say anything now, but I have some very important news. I see most of the British capitalists and I was very glad to see that their opinions are not the same now as they were five or six months ago. They are now willing to do something, and will do it."

"I have come back ready for action," stated Mr. Preston, "and ready to swing my fists, and I still have enough Irish blood left in me to fight my friend, Mr. McLaughlin."

SAYS NOT GUILTY

Iowa Man Accused of Murdering Minister Father and Wounding Mother.

ALLISON, Iowa, Aug. 8.—Warren Vandervoort, charged with murder in connection with the killing of his father, Rev. A. J. Vandervoort, minister, and the serious wounding of his mother, Thursday night, pleaded not guilty when arraigned before District Judge W. P. Walter, last night, and was ordered held for the October term of court.

He is alleged to have written, shortly before being arraigned, was made against the advice of counsel, it was announced.

Heart Still 3 Minutes Adrenalin Revives Child

LORAIN, Ohio, Aug. 8.—Modern surgery triumphed over death at St. Joseph's Hospital when Martha Ericson, 8 years old, was revived after her heart had stopped beating for three minutes.

An anesthetic had been administered by Dr. R. A. Stack, who was about to perform a minor operation on the tonsils when he discovered that the girl had stopped breathing.

The heart had ceased functioning and Dr. Stack injected adrenalin into the heart. It was fully three minutes before the child began to show signs of life.

LIQUOR SEIZED.

SHEPARD, N. B., Aug. 7.—Eighty cases of contraband liquor were seized at Port Elgin recently by Federal authorities, being located under some hay in an old barn. It is believed to have been landed here by a run-runner. A kilt John Trevelyan was arrested recently at Gilbert's Corner for being drunk and creating a disturbance. Cat Goes On Air Tour of U. S. Stations

CLEVELAND, Aug. 8.—The cat mascot at the United States air mail field here, disappeared. She next was seen at Hadley Field, New Brunswick, N. RESTRAINING ORDER FILED BY TAXPAYER

Claims Statute Violates State and Federal Constitutions

FUNDS FOR SCOPES

Scientists Raising \$5,000 to Provide for Post Graduate Studies

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 8.—A petition for a temporary restraining order against Tennessee officials and others, enjoining them from enforcement of the Tennessee anti-evolution law, was filed in Federal court here yesterday by attorney representing J. R. Wilson, of Rhea county, a taxpayer.

The petitioner avers that he is the father of five children who attend the public schools, and that under the Tennessee statute he cannot properly educate them in the modern sciences because he insists that the evolution theory is an irresponsible and dangerous teaching of modern sciences.

LIBERTY QUESTION.

He also contends that, being a taxpayer and contributor to the public school fund, he is being deprived of liberty and property without due process of law. It is claimed that the act violates both the state and federal constitutions and particularly section No. 7 of the Constitution of the United States.

FUND FOR SCOPES.

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Aug. 8.—Dean Jacob B. Lipman, director of the State Agricultural College Experiment Station here, and one of the scientists called to the defence at the recent trial in Dayton, Tenn., of John T. Scopes, for violating the anti-evolution law of that state, yesterday announced that a number of the scientists who attended the trial are raising a \$5,000 fund as a special contribution to enable Scopes to pursue post-graduate studies for three years.

Chicago Revenue Men Seize \$140,000 Drugs

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—A fortune in narcotics, found in a flat which had all the fixtures of an Oriental drug den, was seized by Federal agents.

Kitty Gilbooley, with her husband, Willie, were arrested and charged with carrying on a wholesale traffic that would handle more than \$500,000 of drugs. The drugs confiscated were valued at \$144,000 to \$250,000 with an additional \$100,000 worth of pipes and weighing and measuring requisites.

Four men were arrested as peddlers.

Woman Truant Officer Annoyed 200-lb Mayor

HACKENSACK, N. J., Aug. 8.—Mrs. Isabelle Brenner of Roselle Park, Truant Officer of Midland Township and a member of the Bergen County Republican Committee, was arrested on the complaint of Mayor Max Thiem of Midland Township, charged with disorderly conduct, and a big crowd came to her trial before Recorder Schackenberg.

NEGRO IS LYNCHED BY MISSOURI MOB

The young woman told officers she was compelled to get into the back of the car and was assaulted by the negro. Both she and Ull identified him today.

FARMERS PROTEST

Object to U. S. Government Interference With Co-operative Marketing.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 8.—President Coolidge was asked yesterday by representatives of 800,000 American farmers, by telegraph, to lend his influence to "keep the government's hands off" of co-operative marketing organizations.

Two Arrested For Subbing In Exams.

SPRINGFIELD, Aug. 8.—Frank Nascimbeno, 23, and Albert Phaneuf, 22, both of Ludlow, were arrested here charged with fraud by substituting for inexperienced persons in passing examinations for motor licenses.

In addition, it is said, Phaneuf may be charged with perjury. Nascimbeno is said to have freely admitted the practice, which he declared to be general and that a fee of \$10 was generally charged.

Baroness Freed Of Too Noble Spouse

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 8.—The Baroness Mildred DeVries Van Doerburgh was granted a divorce in Superior Court from Baron Herman De Vries Van Doerburgh, whom she described as a member of a prominent Dutch family. She alleged non-support, explaining that her titled husband was "too noble even to know how to work."

FIGHTING RESUMED.

CRISIS IS RESULT

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—The first intimation that Miss Emmeline Marion Grace, daughter of Eugene G. Grace, president of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation, is not to be married to Sir Michael Wm. Selby Bruce, young Scottish baron, to whom her engagement was announced last December, reached New York last night.

It came in the form of a cable news despatch announcing that Sir Michael, a captain in the Royal Field Artillery, and a wounded veteran of the Somme, is to marry Miss Doreen Daniel Greenwell, in London, today. The bride is a daughter of a colonel in the British army.

Argentine Girl To Try Channel Swim Tonight

BOULOGNE, France, Aug. 8.—Miss Lillian Harrison, the Argentine girl swimmer, will begin her third attempt to swim the English Channel tonight. She will enter the water at Cap Gris Nez about ten-thirty. Weather conditions today are very promising, and the temperature of the channel water is now about 63 degrees.

Bricklaying Champ Lays 36,000 a Day

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 8.—Laying 36,000 bricks a day, or approximately three and one-half carloads, James Brown, an Indian and former Carlysle football player, has gained a reputation among workers on a highway near here as the world's champion bricklayer.

So fast does he work that five men are kept busy supplying with brick and two others are used to keep the face of the road even ahead of him. He receives \$2 an hour, or \$16 a day.

ENLOT COUNTS ON 29 SEATS IN NEXT HOUSE

Baxter Predicts Government Defeated by Big Margin

LOCAL OPINIONS

Candidates Give Last Minute Opinions on Result of Vote

INTENSIVE electioneering throughout the city and province comes to an end tonight, and following the Sunday rest the New Brunswick electors will reach the valley of decision, when, after a short but spirited campaign, a new Legislature will be picked from the 48 provincial constituencies.

Concerning the result, both leaders, Premier Veniot, and Hon. Dr. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., express complete confidence their party will be returned to power.

"I count on 29 of the 48 seats," said Premier Veniot last evening. Dr. Baxter predicted the Opposition would win by a large majority.

STRENUOUS CAMPAIGN.

It is scarcely more than three weeks ago that the date of the election was fixed for August 10 and since that time, not a night has passed without political gatherings of some sort, every part of the province. In Saint John, the Government and Opposition speakers have held forth at many as five meetings during one night, in addition to the mass meetings in the Open House and elsewhere, at which the big guns in the party, have attracted thousands. The issues and questions of the campaign, therefore, are thoroughly before the electors.

Hon. Dr. Baxter will conclude his campaigning tonight at Sussex, while Premier Veniot will speak tonight in Saint Bathurst and South West Miramichi. All the local candidates express high hopes over the outcome of balloting here on Monday.

The tremor extended over a 130 mile line northwesterly from San Diego, the southern extremity, to San Bernardino. No damage was reported.
