World's 18.2 Play Starts On Oct. 29

Entry List, Closing Oct. 8, Is
Limited to Six Players—Hotel
Scene of Battle.

New York, Sept. 24.—Play for the third annual international 18.2 billiard tournament for the professional championship of the world will start on Oct. 29 in Hotel Pennsylvania, this city. The tourney will continue through to Nov. 5. Entries for the championship will close on Oct. 8 and all entries must be accompanied by an entrance fee of \$250. The entry list has been limited to six players, the number that competed last year.

Although no changes have been made in the playing rules, one rather radical change has been made in the conditions governing the competitions for the diamond medal, emblematic of the title. Last year the conditions provided that the players finishing second and third in the tournament should meet in a match game of 1,800 points to determine which should have the privilege of challenging the winner of the tournament for the championship.

This season the winner of the tournament will be subject to challenge by the players in the order in which they finish in the tourney and will be compelled to defend the title every 60 days. Should he succeed in successfully defending the title for one year the medal will become his personal property and another tournament, held to establish a champion. In the event that the player competing in the tournament fail to take advantage of the privilege of challenging the champion in the order in which they finish for 60 days after the conclusion of the tournament or following any challenge, then the champion will be subject to challenge by any player in the world. All challenges must be accompanied by a forfeit of \$300 and the champion must accept the challenge and post a similar amount within 10 days after the filing of the challenge.

Besides donating the diamond medal a well-known billiard table firm will contribute \$5,000 toward the cash prizes which will be awarded the players as follows: first, the \$1,000 diamond medal championship and \$3,000 in cash; second, \$1,500; third, \$1,000; fourth, \$750; and fifth, \$500. The players also will share in the entire gate receipts after the expenses of conducting the tournament have been deducted. The players will share as follows: first, 40 per cent; second, 25 per cent; third, 15 per cent; fourth, 12 per cent; and fifth, 8 per cent.

The first international tournament to be held since 1912 was staged in Chicago in 1921. It was won by Jacob Schaefer after a play-off with W. F. Hoppe. Last year, the second annual international event was held at the Hotel Pennsylvania in New York City.

medal and in the shoot-off Mr. Donnelly won. Complete details of all the scores made will be given in a later issue.

It was then that Hoppe regained the championship. Subsequently he successfully defended it in a challenge match with Schaefer.

Hoppe will defend his title this year and it is virtually certain that Schaefer will attempt to climb to the pinnacle of the billiard world again. Last year Walker Cochran, Edouard Horemans, the champion of Belgium; Roger Conti, who then was the champion of France; and Erich Hagenbacher, the champion of Germany, competed against Hoppe and Schaefer. It is difficult to state at this time what players will take part this year. Conti is now in Europe, but is expected to return to the United States this month or early in October.

Horemans already has returned here. Hagenbacher has remained in the United States throughout the summer. Schaefer and Cochran are on the Pacific coast. It was thought for awhile that Derbier, who won the championship of France while Conti was in America last season, would come here to compete and it is possible that he may do so, but no definite word has yet been received from him.

The tournament games again will be 600 points each, but all challenge matches will be 1,500 points, to be played in three blocks of 500 each.
