Home by The Police.

New York, Dec. 13.—Mrs. Rachel Rutive of Brooklyn stopped to rest in front of the Good Samaritan Dispensary at Broome and Essex streets after a day of shopping with her two-year-old daughter. She offered Charles Chaftz, 12, of 117 Delancey street, and Charles Scheinwald, 12, of 50 most street, a nickel apiece if they would carry the baby to the subway station a block away. The boys refused, saying the child was too heavy.

They went around the corner and talked to their friend, Samuel Sanntarzic, 15, of 117 Delancy street. They told him that they believed the woman was a kidnapper, as she was dark and the baby was a pronounced blond. Samuel found Patrolman Karl Grossman of the Clinton street station. The policeman tried to question Mrs. Rutive, who is an Arabian and speaks very little English, but she became confused and could not make heraelf understood.

The patrolman decided to take her to the police station. The boys went along, carrying the child, and as they went they shouted that the cop had caught a kidnapper. A crowd gathered. By the time the policeman reached the station 2,000 persons were following, cursing Mrs. Rutive.

Once inside the station, Mrs. Rutive became calmer and convinced the police that she was the mother of the child. They wanted to release her, but were afraid to let her leave because of the crowd waiting in front of the station. The reserves scattered the crowd several times, but it came back each time. Finally the police put Mrs. Rutive and her baby and her bundles into a patrol automobile, drew the curtains and drove her home.
