BOWLING.

Games Last Evening.
The winners had a grand total of 1484 and single strings of 512 and 530. The losers totaled 1384.

BASEBALL.

Leo Callahan.
The following item appeared in a recent issue of the Boston Globe:
"A Jamaica Plain boy, formerly a Greater Boston High School pitcher—Leo Callahan—was one of the stars of the Worcester team in the Eastern League this season. Callahan batted around 290 for the Worcester club in 1921 and his hits were frequently of the timely variety.
"Callahan pitched for the High School of Commerce team here in Boston several years ago and has to his credit a no-hit, no-run game while performing in the scholastic ranks. He was given a tryout by Brooklyn and then spent a number of seasons in the International League, playing mostly in the outfield, and five times batting for better than 300. In 1919 he played in the Philly outer garden and the last two years has been playing in Worcester."
Note—It will be recalled that Leo Callahan played here for the Marathons. He pitched a couple of games, but was one of the regular outfielders and although very small in stature and build was one of the most consistent and heaviest hitters on the team. After leaving here he played with Brooklyn where he broke a leg sliding home. He was then sent to Toronto in the International league.

New York, Nov. 4.—Harry Greb, Pittsburgh heavyweight, tonight defeated Charles Weinert, Newark, receiving the judges' decision after a fifteen-round bout.
Greb scored Weinert in the first round with hard rights to the body. Throughout the remainder of the contest, Greb showed blows on Weinert's head and body. In the eleventh, fourteenth and fifteenth rounds, Weinert showed flashes of speed, but got the worst of an exchange of body blows in each instance. Weinert weighed 178½ pounds and Greb 160 3-4.

ARCHIE WALSH EQUALS RECORD FOR 10 STRINGS

Rolls 1217 With 166 as His
Highest One—Only One
Under 100.

Archie Walsh, one of the leading candle pin bowlers in the world, while competing in the New England Bowling Sweepstakes held in Reading, Mass., on October 26 equalled the world's record for ten strings when he toppled over 1217 pins. The record was made by Paul Peeler some years ago. Walsh's strings were:—116, 119, 142, 120, 101, 117, 122, 166, 96, 118—1217, and Paul Winslow of Cambridge finished second with a total of 1140, and Paul Peeler third with 1118.
