

VICTORY LOAN TOATLS FOR THE CITY AND PROVINCE

That St. John city and county invested in the last Victory Loan to the extent of \$121.59 for each man, woman and child, with the total subscriptions up to \$514,050 is shown in the final figures given out at the provincial Victory Loan headquarters here last night.

In the number of applications per capita the best standing is made by St. John city and county, with one application to every five inhabitants; followed by Charlotte, with one to 8.5; Carleton, one to nine, and Westmorland, one to 9.3.

The total subscription for the province is \$17,008,750 as compared with \$10,463,300 in the previous loan, and the number of applications is 31,886, as against 26,436 last year. The number of applications per capita this year is eleven compared with 13.2 last year and the amount per capita is 48.33 as against 29.89 last year.

Doing Men's Work. Fredericton Mail: Owing to the scarcity of men many of the lumber operators are sending boys into the woods this season. A large crew composed mostly of boys ranging in age from fifteen to seventeen years came over the C. G. First Details Of Canadian Armies

The cessation of hostilities in France and Belgium has made the publication of the Order of Battle of the Canadian Forces possible. During four years of war the Canadian troops have covered themselves with glory on the western front and have participated in battles the winning of which has contributed effectively to the victory of the cause of civilization and humanity.

The Canadian forces on the western front comprise the Canadian Army Corps, which includes four infantry divisions of nearly 80,000 men; corps troops of about 10,000 men, the Canadian cavalry brigade which is about 8,000 strong and the line of communication, railway, forestry and other services. Altogether there are about 160,000 Canadians in France.

The second Canadian division under Major-General Sir H. E. Burdall included the Fifth Infantry Brigade, under Brigadier-General T. C. Tremblay, in which was brigaded the 26th battalion from New Brunswick. Brigadier-General Tremblay was formerly O. C. of the 22nd French Canadian battalion.

Although it was announced previously that New Brunswick was given another representative battalion at the front careful perusal of the list fails to see any other battalion, outside the 26th, credited to this province.

It is worthy of note that Canadian special units served with each British army, among these being the Canadians with the Second British army under General Plumer; the Canadians in the Third army under Byng; with the Fourth army under Rawlinson, and with the Fifth under Birdwood, all distinct and separate from the Canadian command under General Currie.

JUDGMENT IN CASE OF SISTER MARY BASIL

Toronto, Dec. 6.—By a judgment of the appellate branch of the supreme court of Ontario, today, Sister Mary Basil loses her case against the Roman Catholic diocesan corporation of the diocese of Kingston and the Sisters of Charity of the House of Providence, but the jury verdict in her favor against Archbishop Spratt, Sister Mary Regis and Dr. Phelan is confirmed.

The court today through Chief Justice Sir Wm. Meredith gave a finding sustaining the appeal of the two corporate bodies against the jury verdict, but dismissing the appeal of the individual defendants in the case. In general terms, the judgment declared that the corporate

bodies in question were not responsible for their representatives' acts in this matter.

The verdict of the jury gave the Sister \$20,000 damages as against the archbishop, Sister Mary Regis, Mother Superior, the diocese and the Sisters of Charity and \$4,000 as against Dr. Phelan, in connection with the forcible removal of Sister Mary from the Sisters of Charity institution.

GOT 100 GALLONS OF RUM.

Halifax Herald—Inspector E. S. Tracey made a capture of booze last night on a road a little beyond Bedford. The liquor was found in a cottage owned by Harry Willis, who keeps a little cobbler shop at Bedford. The inspector or for some time had a suspicion that liquor was being stored in this neighborhood and last night one hundred gallons of overproof rum were discovered in the cottage. The liquor, which filled a seven-passenger car, had arrived on Monday from Montreal, and was taken to the cottage between twelve midnight and daylight. The shipment was intact.
