ENGLAND'S UNEMPLOYED

INSURANCE (Ottawa Citizen).

In Great Britain there has been in existence a scheme of unemployment insurance in most industries which was part of the famous Insurance Act of 1911. It has now been decided that every soldier will receive on his discharge a certificate entitling him to one year's unemployment benefit. Civilians will receive unemployment benefit covering six months, but may not use more than thirteen weeks of that period. The Australian government has committed itself to the principle, as a minimum obligation, of assuming the responsibility of providing the returned soldier with an opportunity of earning at least a living wage and of granting assistance until such opportunity is forthcoming. Here in Canada, the government might be well advised to evolve some similar scheme and see that it is based upon sound principles and administered with efficiency.

COMPULSORY VOTING

(Bangor Commercial.)

The Maine legislators doubtless face a number of perplexing problems, but they are free, thus far, from one that is confronting the members of the Massachusetts general court. This is the question of how men who do not wish to vote can be made to vote and that without violating the sanctity of the secret ballot.

The constitutional convention, recently held in Massachusetts, sent to the voters a proposed amendment giving to the legislature authority to provide for compulsory voting at elections but stating that the right of secret voting shall be preserved. The people passed the amendment at the polls, although without a majority of the voters of the state as much indifference was manifested regarding this amendment.

Now the legislature has before it the problem of how voters can be made to vote without impairing the secrecy of their ballots. It remains to be seen if the legislature will exercise the authority granted it by the popular vote.

One bill looking to compulsory voting has already been introduced and this would impose a financial loss upon the qualified voter who fails to exercise his right of suffrage. It would accomplish this in a roundabout manner by increasing the poll tax and then shifting \$5 to all who vote. But we have not seen any explanation of how such a law would reach the voters who cast a blank ballot. If the voters are compelled to show their ballots to prove that they are marked the secrecy of the vote is violated.

If qualified voters who do not wish to vote are threatened with financial loss they might evade the requirement by visiting the polls and casting a blank ballot and if they were forced in this matter the chances are that it would be an unmarked ballot that they would cast.

The Massachusetts legislators may be able to work out a satisfactory law.
