CHILD WIFE IN MAINE SUES FOR DIVORCE

Married at Fourteen Two Years Ago, Charges Non Support and Abuse

Portland, Me., Oct. 16.—Married when she was 14, Mrs. Ruth W. Palmer, of South Portland, at the age of 18, is suing for divorce from her husband, Harry M. Palmer, of South Portland, who, she alleges, is more than 28 years her senior.

She alleges that he has been guilty of cruel and abusive treatment.

After a hearing in the superior court, Judge Conolly allowed the case to stand open pending the introduction of further evidence on the cruel and abusive treatment alleged.

Mr. Palmer, when she took the stand beside her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Ward, told the court the story of her marriage. She said she first met her husband when he was ten years old, and was washing dishes at the house where she had been employed.

She said she had previously suggested that she had refused to listen to him.

On this occasion, she said, when they reached Dover, she threatened to leave her alone unless she married him.

He took her to the clerk's office, procured a license, and they were married. She was given as 18 instead of 14, said her parents were willing, and under his name.

Since that time she said they had lived with her parents part of the time, but that he had failed to provide for her, and to pay for the things he had secured, had failed to pay for the burial expenses of the child, and finally had left her in Portland. She declared her husband had abused her. Her evidence was corroborated by her parents.

Judge Conolly suggested that if they were not legally married, an action for annulment might be brought, which would be a criminal prosecution for that, but said he could not grant a divorce for the introduction of further evidence.

POTATO TEAMS KILL MAN AND BOY AT PRESQUE ISLE, ME.

Henry Duncan Run Over — Lad Falls From Father's Wagon and Fatally Hurt

Presque Isle, Oct. 16.—Wednesday was a day of tragedies in Presque Isle. Two fatal accidents occurred in which the lives of a man and a child were crushed out by loaded potato teams. Sudden death came to another man as he slept in a sofa in a farmhouse kitchen.

Henry Duncan, thirty-six years old, a prominent and highly respected farmer living on the Tomkins road, met death alone in his potato field between five and 5:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Mr. Duncan started into the field with a two-horse wagon after a load of potatoes. Late in the afternoon the horses appeared in the farm-house yard, drawing the loaded team, but without Mr. Duncan. Search was at once instituted.

Mr. Duncan was found dead in his field. He had evidently been thrown from the loaded potato team and had passed over his body. His neck had been broken and one of his arms was broken in two places. It is believed that he must have been instantaneous.

About three o'clock in the afternoon, Oramand M. Henderson, who lives at Spragueville, was driving a loaded potato team along the Chapman road, when a three-year-old son was seated beside him. Suddenly the wheels struck a rough place and the little boy was jolted from his seat to the ground, the result being a fractured skull. He was probably injured and lived but an hour after being taken home.

Griffin Bidley, Wilford Gager, twenty-two years old, was found dead on a sofa in the kitchen of Robert Buchanan's house, where he boarded. Both he and Buchanan worked for George Gager, a nearby farmer. Buchanan applied to Gager for a night and heard sounds in the kitchen where he found Gager asleep on the sofa.
