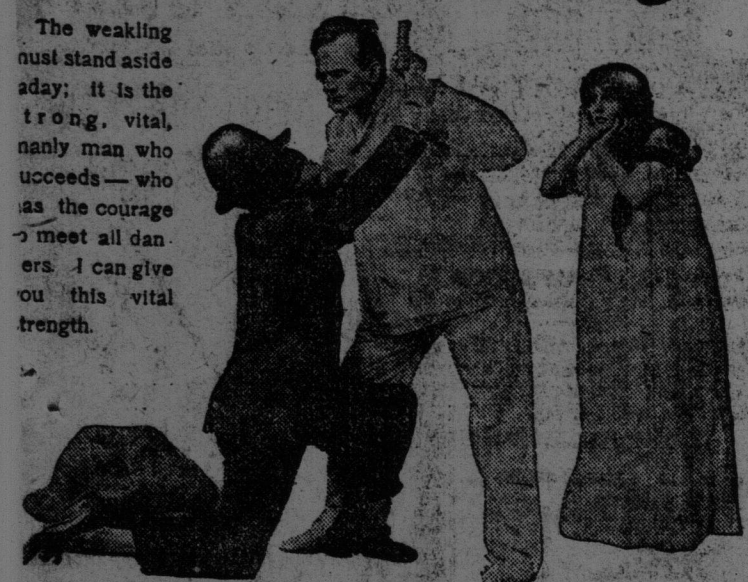

Oppose Johnson-Flynn Fight.
Salt Lake City, Utah, Jan. 10.—Bitter opposition to the proposed Johnson-Flynn fight has developed throughout Nevada. As yet, no action has been taken by the Nevada Athletic Union, but it is probable that any fight staged near the Nevada-Utah line will accrue to Salt Lake City, while any claim attached to it will remain with Nevada. A proposal to call a special session of the Nevada legislature to repeal the law, under which unlimited prize fights are sanctioned, has been discussed freely by leading politicians, and there is no doubt that Governor Odell will be urged to do his utmost to prevent the fight.

DRAGOONS THOUGHT THE ENEMY WAS ON THEM

Sensational But Amusing Episode in German Army Manoeuvres

Berlin, Jan. 10.—A case which has just been heard before the highest military court at Breslau brings to light a peculiar and somewhat humorous incident of the recent German army manoeuvres. The prosecution brought an action against Lieutenant von Hoydelsbreck of the Oels rifle regiment, accusing him of misuse of authority and of causing grievous bodily injury and material damage. The facts as they were stated before the court were as follows:

Lieutenant von Hoydelsbreck, regiment co-operated in the manoeuvres with the Herford regiment, also dragoons. One night the lieutenant was instructed by his superior officers to take a company of dragoons and attempt a surprise attack upon a party of dragoons who were bivouacked several miles away. The lieutenant carried out his orders with startling success. Unchallenged by sentry he outspied his company approach the sleeping camp of dragoons and opened fire with blank cartridges at close quarters. The effect was a wild stampede. Horses broke loose from their tethering posts and dashed madly through the darkness, falling over tent ropes and breaking the poles, by which the dragoons were injured.

The dragoons, awakened from sleep by the rattle of rifle fire to find their camp falling about them and with their heads full of the sensational war rumors current at the time, were immediately ordered to take to the heels. They were in force. They lost their nerve utterly, and for a considerable time the wildest confusion reigned in which more men and animals were seriously injured.

The lieutenant, in his own defence, declared, of course, that he had merely carried out his orders, and the court, adopting his view of the matter, gave judgment of acquittal.

"GENERAL DELIVERY" SOURCE OF DANGER

Clandestine Correspondence With Young Girls and Married Women—Matter for Investigation

New York, Jan. 9.—A national movement to prevent young girls and women from receiving letters at the "general delivery" window of post offices may result from a crusade started at Jamaica, L. I., by Postmaster Warren H. Ashmead. The custom of delivering letters at the "general delivery" window was instituted for the benefit of travellers who were not sure at what hotels they would stop, and whose mail was held for them until they called at the post-office.

But investigation by Ashmead and by postal authorities all over the nation have shown that this is now only a minor part of the general delivery mail. A vast majority of it now appears to be for men and women who do not, any longer, wish to have their mail delivered to them at the post-office.

The situation in Jamaica was such an acute stage that Ashmead has appealed to Postmaster-General Hitchcock for permission to stop the practice. Hundreds of young girls, he declares, are getting mail this way, without the knowledge of their parents, while many married men and women are clandestinely receiving their letters from admirers through the medium of the general delivery window. "There is a moral question involved," declared Ashmead, "that really is a serious one."
