The exact number of victims has not been learned, but 200 persons are said to have been killed. The greater number of deaths were at Cetara, on the north coast of the Gulf of Salerno. The monetary loss is great. The disaster appears to have come in the form of a cyclone having three centres, the first over the island of Ischia, the second over the town of Torre del Greco, on the east coast of the Bay of Naples, and the third sweeping the Gulf of Salerno.
