HOW RECIPROCITY WILL AFFECT THE PRICES

Good for Consumer and Buyer According to Report of Department of Labor Just Issued

Ottawa, Aug. 11.—One of the most illuminative contributions to the literature dealing with the economic aspect of the reciprocity agreement has just been issued by the labor department, and has been mailed today to every newspaper office in Canada.

It is the compendium of comparative prices in Canada and the United States for agricultural, fisheries, lumber and mines products covered by the schedules of the agreement, and to which reference was made some days ago by Hon. Mackenzie King.

It covers 216 pages and is a veritable mine of wealth for political candidates, campaign speakers, editorial writers and all students of the vital point at issue in the discussion of the agreement, namely, as the economic effect reciprocity in natural products will have on both producers and consumers in Canada.

The comparative statistics of market prices at representative points on each side of the border, gathered from reliable daily market reports cover the past five and a half years, thus giving a true index as to the average prices.

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In general, it may be stated that the most significant conclusions to be drawn from the voluminous and comprehensive statistics of the report are the prices received by the producers in Canada, affected by the agreement, are on the whole considerably below the prices received by the producers in the United States, while in many instances the prices paid by the consumer in Canada are above those paid in the States.

The first conclusion bears out the argument that the farmer and the fisherman will greatly benefit from reciprocity. The second conclusion bears out the argument that the Canadian consumer is in many cases suffering from undue enhancement of prices by the middleman, a condition of affairs which reciprocity would tend to obviate and which explains the opposition of certain interests to the pact.

Comparative prices for fish indicate the immense benefit which free entry for fish into the American market will confer on the Maritime Provinces.

Halibut at Halifax averaged during the five and a half years \$12 cents per lb., as compared with 14.75 cents per lb. at Boston; cod at Halifax averaged 3.62 cents per lb., as compared with 7 cents at Boston; mackerel at Halifax averaged 14.8 cents per lb., as compared with 23 cents at Boston.

CAPTURE CONVICT WHO TERRORIZED WESTMORLAND

Moncton, Aug. 11.—Olaf Larsen, the Norwegian convict, who has been terrorizing the country since his escape from the Westmorland reformatory, has at last been captured. Chief Reidout took Larsen into custody near Petticoat, the convict having been seen in the vicinity of the town.

When first seen Larsen was on the road but took to the woods, and the chief made a search and found him hiding in the underbrush. He surrendered without a struggle, stating he was tired and hungry. Chief Reidout arrived back in Moncton at 9:30.

Larsen will be arraigned tomorrow morning before Magistrate Kay. Since starting on his criminal career, he is alleged to have stolen or lured property to the extent of \$1,075. It is also said he stole four horses, two sets of harness, two wagons, burned a barn containing a horse, farm machinery at a loss of \$1,000. The last horse and rig was stolen from Harry Douglas in the vicinity of Killam's Mills and also two bags of feed from I. N. Killam's mill. This rig was recovered, as well as the horses.

Besides this it is alleged he visited Moncton and burglarized a house, stealing a gold watch and other things. He had around Moncton for two days, he states, trying to catch the man who gave evidence against him at the time he was last sent to the penitentiary for stealing.

Larsen told the chief he made up his mind when he got out of jail this time he would steal something worth while. The capture of so desperate a character is one of the most important in years and the people in the country districts will feel great relief.

Ottawa, Aug. 11.—Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux took the oath of office this afternoon, on assuming his new portfolio of marine and fisheries and of naval affairs.

Hon. Mr. Brodeur signed his last official document as minister of the crown, this morning, the order in council appointing him to the Supreme Court bench having been signed this afternoon by his excellency.

Mr. Lemieux leaves for Montreal in the morning and will meet Mr. Bourassa of the public platform at St. Hyacinthe on Sunday in what promises to be one of the most spectacular meetings of the campaign.

Dr. Beland, the successor to Mr. Lemieux as post master general, will be sworn in before his excellency at Murray Bay on Saturday of next week, after speaking at the premier's meetings in Three Rivers and Quebec on Thursday and Friday.

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NOBLE OFFICER NOT TO BLAME

Ottawa, Aug. 11.—Deputy Minister Desbarats issued a further statement this afternoon in which he characterized as false stories said to have emanated from Halifax to the effect that Commander MacDonald, of the Niobe, had surrendered his sword to Admiral Kingsmill and that other officers of the Niobe had been to a ball in Yarmouth the night of the accident. He said if Commander MacDonald had let his sword behind it was because he found it inconvenient to carry it.

An inquiry into the accident is being conducted, but pending its outcome there will be no action against anyone. He has yet to receive evidence that officers of the Niobe were to blame.

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LONDON STRIKE SETTLED; WORK BEGINS ON MONDAY

London, Aug. 11.—The strike of dockmen, lightermen, coal porters and carmen, which for several days has seriously disturbed all business in London and resulted in a shortage of food stuffs, coal, petrol and other necessities, was ended tonight with the settlement of the lightermen's dispute. The men are conceded a ten-hour day and an increase of about twenty per cent in wages. The situation had become so critical that troops were held in readiness at Aldershot and other places to proceed to the capital and intervene. A manifesto congratulating the men on the signal victory obtained and declaring the strike ended.

The dispute of the carters and dockers already has been settled and today there only remained to compromise with the lightermen to bring about a return to normal conditions.

Until a late hour tonight it was doubtful whether an agreement would be reached, and both Home Secretary Churchill and Sydney Buxton, president of the board of trade, cancelled their week-end engagements in order to remain at the board of trade where conferences looking to the ending of the strike had been in progress. It is now expected that all the men will resume work on Monday.

The evening in London passed quietly. There were no street disturbances, and owing to police protection the transfer of meat and other food stuffs by the circuitous underground railway connections from the depots to the markets had been effected. With the supplies thus secured today it is expected that the people will feel less inconvenienced tomorrow.

CANADA CROP REPORT

Ottawa, Aug. 11.—The condition of field crops in Canada is presented in a bulletin of the census and statistics office issued today for July 31, and shows good averages for all provinces as well as for all crops.

Fall wheat was hurt by the hard winter in Ontario, but fared better in Alberta. The condition of spring wheat at the end of July was 90 for the whole, being 85 to 90 in the maritime provinces; 80 to 89 in Ontario and Quebec; 90 to 96 in the northwest provinces, and 85 in British Columbia.

Oats and barley have an average condition of 88 for Canada; 85 to 86 in the maritime provinces; 80 to 90 in Ontario and Quebec; 88 to 100 in the northwest provinces, and 87 to 89 in British Columbia.

The average of corn for husking is 86, and of potatoes 83.64, being in each case a little higher than last year. Potatoes, turnips and mangolds range from 81 to 85, or about the same as a year ago.

Hay and clover and alfalfa are 80 to 83, which is a little lower in each case than last year. Corn for fodder has an average condition of 87; sugar beets, of 79, and pasture of 79.

The eastern provinces are lower than the figures quoted for the whole of Canada, and the western provinces are higher. The yield of hay and clover is estimated at 12,180,000 tons for Canada, being 1.43 tons per acre, and the largest yields for the provinces are: Ontario, 4,736,000 tons; Quebec, 8,628,000 tons; Prince Edward Island, 254,000 tons; Nova Scotia, 841,000, and New Brunswick, 885,000 tons.
