FINDS INDIAN TRIBE
RULED BY WOMEN

American Explorer Locates Colony on Upper Amazon—It May be Basis of Old Amazonian Legend.

Boston, Jan. 8.—An Indian tribe of South America ruled entirely by women was described by Dr. A. Hamilton Rice in a lecture before the Lowell Institute. The tribe lives on the Icana River, a branch of the Upper Amazon, where Dr. Rice went on a trip of exploration.

The women of the tribe appeared to be permanent residents of the village. Dr. Rice said, while the men who were there came mostly from tribes along

the river Guiana. The ancient Amazonian legend of a tribe of self-supportive women, visited from time to time by men of other tribes, came to the explorer's mind with his discovery, he said, and indicated to him that he might have found the basis for the legend.

During his lecture Dr. Rice was asked if he believed that former President Roosevelt's life had been shortened by the effects of his South African journey. He replied:

"Yes, he died from the effects of his journey to South America. There was not a doctor in New York who knew what ailed him."

The object of Dr. Rice's exploration was mainly to determine the character of the country surrounding the Tilla, Mesaya, and Inirida Rivers, and to identify these rivers.

At San Martin he found 800 persons served by three priests who be-moaned their lack of knowledge of medicine. Many of their parishioners were suffering from disease. Dr. Rice's examinations developed that they carried the tertian form of malarial parasites and the epidemic skin disease known as yaws, a particularly disfiguring form. Two May Die as Result of Collision of Electric Train and Motor Truck.
