J. B. Snowball Company, Limited, to Commence Operations at Chatham Plant

Chatham, May 19.—It is expected that the big lumber mill of the J. B. Snowball Company, Limited, will commence operations the latter part of this week. Neither the company's mill at Tracadie nor the Lyman Mill at the upper end of the town will be run this year. All the company's logs will be brought here, consequently a big cut is expected. It is probable that the mill will run at least six months. The company is continuing to run their planing mill and when the big mill commences sawing the unemployment situation here will be relieved to a great extent.

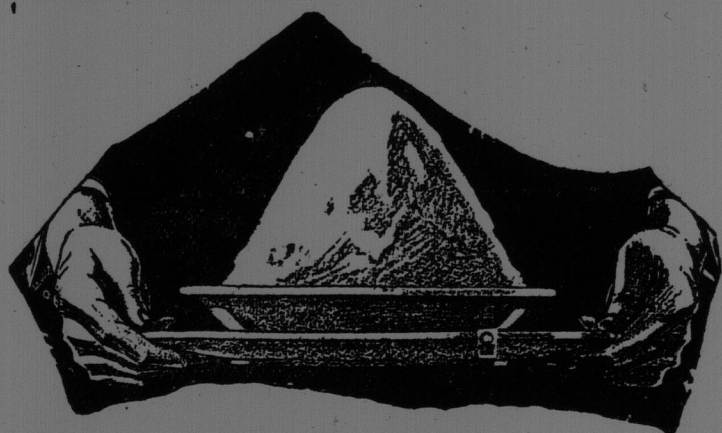

He often wondered what brought about that "spring feeling." Generally what happens is this:—

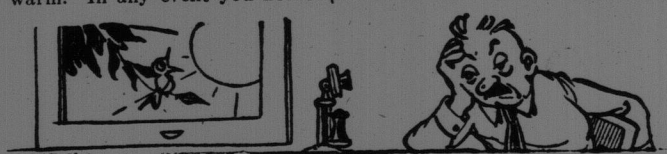

Good brisk walks in the outdoors will help.

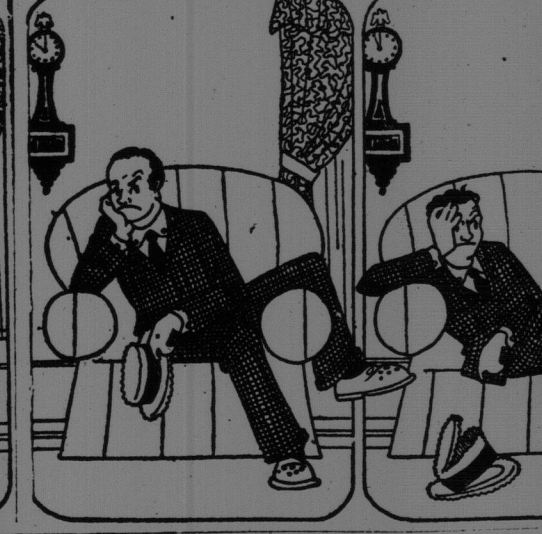
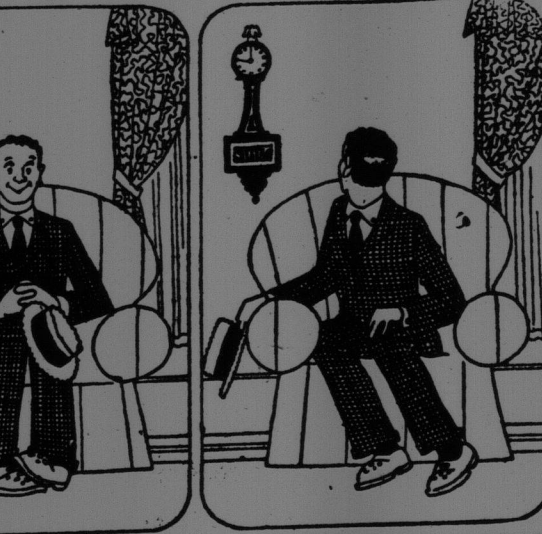
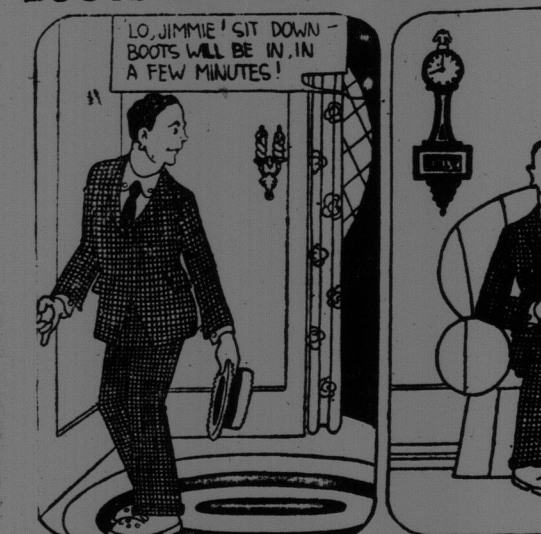
