One of the latter class, a female, surrounded by a numerous offspring, says, that she never had such sweet company before as the Bible which your Committee has put into her hands. In every instance the Scriptures seem to have been thankfully received. That the Lord may grant to this Society many seals of their labours of love, is the prayer of your Committee.
