Sir,

With further reference to suicide of Manyan,

I beg to advise you that the coroner did not consider an inquest necessary; deliberate self destruction being very evident.

The finding of jury mentioned in my letter of former date had reference to the murders near Raymond. Investigation by the police failed to establish the fact that liquor had anything to do with the tragedy.

It was quite evident that though Manyan may have been intoxicated when he murdered the three near Raymond he was undoubtedly sober when he shot himself.

No one having any knowledge of the murders for some time after, it is difficult to arrive at any reliable conclusion as to cause.
