Notes and Suggestions of Practical Utility

FOR THE FARM, FIELD, GARDEN AND
DAIRY.

Cleanings of Interest for Our Country
Readers.

Raise more and buy less.

Potatoes do well after clover.

The apple is the king of fruits.

Prepare racks for winter feeding.

Neglect seldom pays in anything.

A box 12x18x12 holds a bushel.

Go for improvement in everything.

Fruit bruised in handling soon rots.

Pulverize your soil and make it soluble.

Clover is the natural food of the hog.

Book what is a good wood destroyer.

Shade trees are pleasant companions.

in the fall as an early spring feed.

It is better to have a team matched in gait,
strength and motion than in looks.

There is no gain in going away from home
until your local market is supplied.

Always sell timely in preference to clover,
which is of greater fertilizing value.

It often works well to supplement barnyard
manure with commercial fertilizers.

When thereby, remember that milk, skim-
med or unskimmed, is non-intoxicating.

As far as possible, feed all you raise on the
farm, and raise on it farm all you feed.

POULTRY YARD.

Feather Pulling and Egg Setting.

At one time the voice of feather pulling was
supposed to be occasioned by the lack of some
substance required by the body, and hence
meat, green food, etc., but no cure was found.

We have now learned that the vice is due to
disease; hence poultrymen aim to keep their
hens healthy at all times. Knowing this, the
difficulty may be prevented to a certain
extent, but to cure the vice is not so easy.

First the guilty hen—the one that pulls the
feathers from the others—must be discovered
or she will teach the whole flock. As a rule,
the cock is the first victim to be deprived of
his feathers, and when he is killed until
nearly naked, some of the hens also come in
for the torture. The feathers are swallowed,
and as they have fresh clots of blood on the
ends, are highly nutritious. The hens notice
this, and are tempted to peck at the feathers
to be pulled. To prevent this, the feathers
must be separated from all others
until they forget the vice, and some per-
sons even go so far as to smear tar on the
feathers, and when he is killed until
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
