DAIRY INSPECTION

TO COMMENCE

Herds to Be Graded and Results Published in Gazette.

Arrangements are being made for the provincial government to put into effect the rules and regulations for the inspection and grading of dairies and herds throughout the province. The results of the inspection and grading will be published in the Provincial Gazette. This is thought will have the effect of improving the premises in which cows are kept and insuring freedom from tuberculosis. The regulations which are to be enforced with the method of grading is as follows:

The inspector shall inspect all dairies and dairy premises maintained for the supply of milk to the public, and all cows from which such milk is taken. After such inspection the inspector shall grade the dairies and herds inspected as follows:

Grade A premises found to be in a sanitary condition within the meaning of the regulations of the provincial board of health governing the sale of milk and the management of dairies, cow sheds and milk shops, and the herd has been tested once for tuberculosis and has been found free from disease.

B premises that do not strictly conform to said regulations, and the herd has been tested once a year for tuberculosis and has been found free from disease.

C premises that conform with said regulations but the herd has not been tested for tuberculosis.

D premises that do not comply with said regulations and the herd has not been tested for tuberculosis.

The grading made as above set out shall be published within the meaning of the regulations of the provincial board of health governing the sale of milk and the management of dairies, cow sheds and milk shops, and the herd has been tested once a year for tuberculosis and has been found free from disease.

COMMITTEES NAMED

FOR LABOR COUNCIL

Delegates to Trades and Labor Congress Appointed Next Week.

(From Thursday's Daily.) The election of officers of the Victoria Trades and Labor Council was concluded at last night's meeting. A. Argyle was elected corresponding and recording secretary. A. Herberger, treasurer, J. Goldstraw, sergeant-at-arms; Delegates: Watters, Argyle, Douglas, Herberger and Stewart, executive committee.

President Watters named the following standing committees for the term: Organizing committee—P. Whyte, W. Thacker, J. Foulton, Legislative—E. McEachern, J. Goldstraw, Fred. Pink. Hall. Committee—J. C. Walters, C. Sivertz, R. Ryan, E. P. Garland, Geo. Thibault. Finance committee—R. Thomas, Geo. Thibault, J. Lister. Press committee—R. Ryan, E. A. McEachern and M. Nicholson.

Delegates to the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress, which meets in Quebec this year, will be named at next meeting. The audit committee reported on the books for the six months, finding them all correct. The bank balance is nearly \$500.

Excellent progress was reported by the committee having in hand the soliciting of stock in the proposed labor temple. Since last meeting the Tailors', Plumbers' and Letter Carriers' Unions have subscribed liberally for stock, both as unions and individual members.

The Bricklayers' Union wrote to say that they were giving serious consideration to the question of being represented on the Labor Council.

Frank Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor, wrote thanking the council for a donation of twenty-five dollars to the "Gompers defense fund."

Delegate Garland reported that the "Cook's and Waiters' Union" had investigated the charge that members of the union patronized non-union barber shops, and found the charges entirely unfounded.

The sidewalk carpenters working for the city wrote asking for the council's good offices in enabling them to get high wages. The secretary was instructed to advise them to join the Carpenters' Union, when their chances of gaining their desired wage will be greatly enhanced.

Many unions wrote endorsing the scheme of appointing an organizer for three months.

The question between the Standard Laundry, the Victoria Laundry and the Annual Labor Review was left in the hands of the press committee.

CAT EXHIBITION AT THE POULTRY SHOW

Subject is Receiving Attention—Provincial Association Suggested.

(From Thursday's Daily.) A meeting of the poultrymen of this city was held last evening in the Labor hall. Business left over from the last meeting was the first taken up. The committee appointed to look into the matter of the advisability of the adding of a cat show to the annual poultry show did not have a report.

Mr. Large, the cat judge of this city, however, was present and gave some interesting facts. He thought that the addition of a cat show would be a good idea, and said that this same thing had been tried at Vancouver and Seattle shows with great success. Mr. Large stated that the cat show attracted a large number of ladies. His idea of the fixing up of the cat show was to have a room for them just the same as they do for the pigeons and bantams. As the taxes on dogs has advanced, Mr. Large said he thought that cats would become the pet animal and therefore a large number of entries would be the result. It was then decided to add Mr. Large to the committee to look into the matter.

S. Y. Wootton gave an interesting address on the raising of young chickens, in which he described the size of the coops to be used in the raising of them, and the proper way of feeding them. A number of interesting points were brought out and a number of discussions followed.

R. W. Hodson, live stock commissioner, was present and spoke on the formation of the B. C. Poultryman's Association. In which all the other poultry associations of the province would come into line. Mr. Hodson, after scoring a number of good points, convinced all those present that the need of one was necessary.

Mr. Jull, poultry commissioner of this province, was also present and gave an interesting talk. He said he was pleased to see the bright outlook of what he felt was destined to be the leading industry in this province. It was coming up each year, and they could not tell what it would amount to in time to come.

The subject chosen for the next meeting was "Feeding, Handling and the Care of the Bird of the Market." It will be treated by T. Edwards.

ENGLISH ARTIST'S WORK IS ADMIRER

J. Carrier at Present in City Has Fine Display of Paintings.

Many of those who visited Mount Adelaide Tuesday afternoon and evening were surprised and delighted at the splendid art exhibit shown by Mr. J. Carrier, the English artist, through the kindness of Mrs. Croft's courtesy and kindness. Hundreds of canvases displayed in the billiard room, depicted the beauties of our own coast scenery, and also of the Jervis Inlet, while several very beautiful views of the outskirts of Toronto delighted those who recognized them in familiar landmarks.

Among the portraits, a most striking and life-like one of D. R. Harris, attracted a great deal of admiring attention. Another very interesting portrait is that of Mr. Carrier's daughter, a girl of fifteen or so, in a dainty blue dress against a most effective background, and holding loosely in the upturned palm of one hand a couple of roses. The tinting and character expressed in the hand, are most life-like.

In the subject pictures, "Sorrow," a young girl holding in her hand a dead pigeon, and bravely trying to suppress the tears, is a very clever piece of work. "Music in the Backwoods," which attracted a great deal of attention, shows a young man seated in his lonely, cheerless cabin, playing on a mandolin. His dog crouches in a listening attitude at his feet, and through the half-open door one catches a glimpse of a bear standing upright in the snow. "Nearer My God to Thee" is an exceedingly beautiful conception. In the background are the clouds and rocks and gloom, and at his feet rolls the Jordan, but above and beyond, a radiant light is shining, glorifying the way. Still another sacred canvas is a magnificent conception of Moses, when from the mountain top, before his death, the angel of the Lord stands beside him and shows him the beauty of the promised land which he is never to enter.

"Gone," is the suggestive title of a lone girl standing on a rock straining her eyes to catch a last glimpse of a boat which has disappeared. The waves are beating all around her, and her retreat is cut off, but she is so absorbed as to be unconscious of danger.

"Victoria," shows the C. P. R. wharf, the Empress hotel, post office and Parliament buildings, and speeding away from all marks of civilization is a boat full of Indians. The conception of the artist in this picture is that the coming of the white man means inevitably the passing of the Indian.

"The Breadwinner," shows a young girl with a pale, tired face, who has just returned from a hard day's work. She is leaning back in a most pathetic attitude, while beside her on a little table is a pile of coins.

"Moonlight" at Oak Bay is a little gem, and "Sunset" on Burrard Inlet is a charming companion piece.

The "Road Over the Hill," which has been purchased by Mrs. Croft, is another gem, which shows the glories of the broom, with the mountains and ocean faintly outlined. The scene was painted just beyond the golf links, and is readily recognizable.

Mr. Carrier spent five months on the Jervis Inlet, and a number of large and very beautiful canvases are proof that the time spent there was not lost. Mr. Carrier's pictures show him to be a most versatile artist. His paintings

the different seasons, and rural or marine scenery with equal sympathy, and keeps close to nature in his coloring. It is much to be regretted that Victoria has no art gallery, where artists who come here could have an opportunity of showing their canvases, and Victorians a chance to learn what true art really means. The public and high schools have recently been doing much in educating children along artistic lines, but the scope of public schools is necessarily limited. If Victoria had an art school where the paintings of good artists could be exhibited, and instruction given in advanced art work, it would not only attract outside students to the city, but would prevent those having artistic inclinations going abroad in search of tuition.

SEEK CHANGES IN FISHING REGULATIONS

Nanaimo Delegation Waits Upon R. W. Venning and Ask Amendments.

R. N. Venning, of Ottawa, superintendent of fisheries for Canada, who is out west on an inspection of the traps and fishing station, visited Nanaimo this week. Accompanied by E. G. Taylor, the local inspector of fisheries, he made a cruise along the coast in the Alcedo, and visited the Biological station and the lobster beds on Mudge Island. Mr. Venning was interviewed by a number of Nanaimo business men in reference to the proposed changes in the regulations governing the fishing industry in Nanaimo harbor and adjacent waters, says the Nanaimo Herald. They protested against the regulations put in force by the government last winter which put a stop to selling for herring in the local waters, claiming the loss to the city financially by reason of such regulations amounted to many thousands of dollars annually, and asked that the regulations be revoked and the old order of things allowed to prevail.

Mr. Venning, in reply to the delegation stated he had no authority to change any existing regulations, as he was simply out west on a tour of inspection, but on his return to Ottawa he would lay their case before the minister of marine and fisheries, and he was sure their request would receive very consideration.

It is claimed that the financial loss to Nanaimo by reason of the prohibition of herring selling amounts to over two hundred thousand dollars annually. The figures given by the loss sustained through the enforcement of the recent regulations including lumber used for boxed herring sent to the Orient, wages of fishermen, coal and gasoline used on launches and steamers engaged in the trade, and various other items, are as follows: Lumber, \$65,425; salt, \$59,250; nails, \$1,155; wages, \$73,500; coal, \$10,000; nets, etc., \$14,750; gasoline, \$2,100; lighters to Vancouver, \$36,750.

A contract has been arranged by which the Australian Mail Line of steamers which ply between San Francisco and Australia shall call at Suva and carry sugar regularly from that port to the refinery at Vancouver. The most of the sugar for the refinery has come from Java and was brought by tramp steamers. The Australian Mail Line maintains a monthly service.

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GREENWICH LEFT FOR NOME CITY

Deckload of Lumber Lashed This Morning—Made Smart Passage.

(From Thursday's Daily.) Steamer Greenwich passed out today bound for Nome with a cargo of sack coal and lumber from Nanaimo and Chemainus. She arrived in the Royal Roads last night and arrangements had been made for E. B. Marvin & Co. to put a scow load of supplies on her. Owing to the swell, however, it was found impossible to transfer the goods until morning, when they were safely shipped. Five firemen and a cook were also supplied the ship at this port, the men having come over from Port Townsend to join her.

The steamer has a large deck-load of lumber, the lashing of which occupied all this morning, all being snug when she pulled out.

Speaking of his last trip Captain George Care said that his ship made a record trip to Nome the last time he was there. Going both ways he was hemmed in by the ice, several times but small lanes seemed to open up, so that he got through without delay. The Puritan started ten days ahead of him, but on his return he met that steamer going in.

The discharging at Nome occupied only five days, this being very smart work when it is considered that all the cargo had to be lightered four miles to shore.

M. S. DOLLAR HAS CARGO OF SULPHUR

Steamer Taking 10,000 Tons to Swanson Bay for Pulp Making.

(From Thursday's Daily.) The preparations for pulp-making at Swanson Bay by the Canada Pacific Pulp Works are well advanced and yesterday afternoon Victorians were reminded of the fact by the steamer M. S. Dollar, which anchored off the harbor for several hours while Captain Morton cleared his ship. She had on board 1,000 tons of sulphur, which she is taking to Swanson Bay to be used in the manufacture of pulp.

This is the first consignment of sulphur which has been taken to that port for the purpose, and as there is no custom house at Swanson Bay it was necessary for her to clear here. This was done by the agents, R. P. Hiltch & Co. The M. S. Dollar brought a full cargo of sulphur from Japan to San Francisco where part of it was discharged. When the present consignment has been delivered at Swanson Bay the steamer will go to Portland, at which port she will discharge the balance of her cargo.

The M. S. Dollar is the steamer that was taken by the Japanese during the war with Japan when trying to run the blockade at Vladivostok. She was repurchased by the Dollar company after the war was over.

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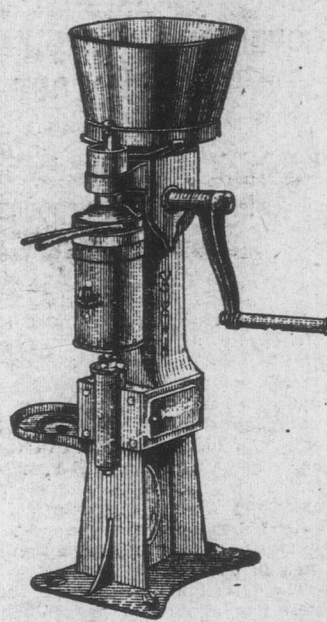
