Greatest in its History

AMHERST, N. S., Feb. 2.—The greatest election in the history of the town took place here today, resulting in the election of Thomas P. Lowther, mayor for the third term, and A. W. Moffat, David L. Smith and George W. Cole as councillors. Ex-Councillor John A. Crossman, who opposed Mr. Lowther, was nominated with the successful councillors, while Mayor-elect Lowther was nominated and endorsed by the Mayor party, whose nominees for councillors suffered defeat. The vote stood as follows: For Mayor, Lowther, 628; Crossman, 474; majority for Lowther, 154. For councillors, Arthur W. Moffat, 571; David Smith, 667; George W. Cole, 571. Labor candidates—Howard Ripley, 444; James Duxbury, 380; John Beal, 283.

The vote polled was about equal to that of last year, although over a thousand were disfranchised because of nonpayment of taxes. While party politics are largely eliminated from civic life, it may be interesting to note that while last year's council was composed of five Conservatives and two Liberals, this year's four Liberals and three Conservatives.

BIG RAILWAY SCHEME FOR SISTER PROVINCE

TORONTO, Feb. 2.—The visit of Premier Murray of Nova Scotia with some colleagues and officials to Wm. MacKenzie of the Canadian Northern railway is the prelude, it is understood, to further railway development in the province, and it is anticipated that when the legislature of Nova Scotia meets again the premier will have advanced railway programme to announce, and the Canadian Northern interests will play a prominent part in that programme. It could not be ascertained whether the Dominion Atlantic Railway Company is to join in an advanced railway policy or not, but as the government and company are on friendly terms, there is no doubt that whatever definite schemes are decided on, there will be cordial cooperation among all the railway interests of the province.

The whole question of new roads, new railways and utilization of water power has been carefully gone into. It is understood and as a result of consultations with the Canadian North-

ern, the leaders' policy has been agreed upon which will entail the construction of several hundreds of miles of steam and electric railways, arrangements of running rights over the intercolonial and all other independent lines in the province, and the probable merging of these independent lines under one management.

It is understood that the province will be asked to guarantee the bonds and in return will have practical control of rates, with the right of buying out the various lines at the end of a period of years. In connection with the scheme it is said that water power for developing electricity, telephones and telegraphs have all come under discussion between MacKenzie and the government, but whether any decision was arrived at is uncertain. The terms under which the MacKenzie interests are operating a coast line from Yarmouth to Halifax are to be revised and several changes made, all of which is said to be for the benefit of shippers and passengers using the line.

JUDGE ORDERS A NEW TRIAL

REGINA, Sask., Feb. 2.—At the opening of court today the jurors in the famous criminal libel case of King v. Premier Scott, in which ex-Mayor Laird was the real prosecutor, reported that after an all night siege they had been unable to agree. The judge sent them out again, but the jury finally reported that it was unable to agree on a verdict. The foreman told Judge Newlands that they had reduced the number of dissenting votes from five hundred dollars for his city campaign fund and found him innocent of all but the accusation made by Scott in his paper. The stickler was whether this five hundred dollars was used for his personal purposes.

The judge asked whether there was any possibility of an agreement being reached, and being told that the jury and ordered a new trial.

CHIEFLY FOR TERMINALS FOR TRANSCONTINENTAL

Dr. Pugsley Discusses Appropriations for St. John Harbor.

OTTAWA, Feb. 2.—Hon. Dr. Pugsley stated to your correspondent that the appropriation of \$400,000 for St. John harbor is to provide general shipping facilities at that port. It will, however, be particularly devoted to providing for terminals for the National Transcontinental. After the engineers have completed their investigation and reported finally the details of the expenditure will be decided on. It will be the first time the expenditures at St. John harbor will be charged to capital account. Thus the port of St. John is placed on the same basis as Timpan, Port William and Victoria harbor in the matter of expenditure.

SEVENTEEN DEAD IN A MINE EXPLOSION

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Feb. 2.—Seventeen men are dead as a result of an explosion in the No. 2 Short Creek mine of the Birmingham Coal Company, ten of whom were white and twelve negroes. The explosion occurred just before noon and it is thought to have been caused by a windy shot.

The mine is practically uninjured. Alex. Bonneyman, manager of the company, was the first to leave Birmingham for the scene of the disaster, although Mine Inspectors Millhouse and Flynn hurried to the scene to render what aid they could and to make an inspection. Officials of the company did not know the exact number of the men in the mine at the time of the accident. Ambulances were sent from Ensley to the scene and late tonight coffins will be rushed to the ill-fated mine.

WOMAN DRAGGED UP MOUNT

Too Fat to Climb, She is Assisted by Ten Stalwart Guides.

GENEVA, Feb. 2.—Mrs. Bohren, of Grindelwald, has just made a famous ascent of the Faulhorn (5555 feet), in the Swiss Oberland.

She owns a hotel on the crest of the mountain, and on leaving that number of sisters whom she had determined to make the ascent to minister personally to their wants. She had not visited the house for years.

The task she set herself was, however, no easy one, as she is middle aged and weighs 24 pounds. Moreover, the ascent was particularly difficult owing to the heavy fall of snow.

Mrs. Bohren engaged the services of ten strong guides. They roped her to themselves and then dragged her up the mountain side without mishap. She has decided to stay until the snow melts. It is the first time that she has opened the hotel in winter.
