**Fishing Season Proved Very Poor**  
Only About 145 Barrels of Alewives Against Catch of 13,000 Barrels Last Year.

This year's fishing season has proved very poor, as only about 145 barrels of alewives have been picked in comparison with 13,000 last year. About 455 barrels of last year's catch with this year's are on the market at the present time.

A reason for the small catch of 1921 is the presence of a large number of sea dogs in the harbor. The price of pickled fish is firm owing to the scarcity.

The sardine business this season has also been a failure owing to the heavy storms playing havoc with the vessels and the nets in many places not being removed. The price for sardines was about five dollars per bushel, but owing to the largeness of the factories opening and the fall in the amount handled was negligible.

**CHANCE FOR BOYS**  
G. B. Allan, secretary of the local division of the Navy League of Canada, received a telegram from Toronto yesterday morning, stating that there were eight vacancies in the Canadian naval service. Boys will be enrolled as cadets and if they are the right kind of boys, with a tendency toward faithfulness to duty, they may work up to an officer's berth. ## Lt.-Gov. Pugsley and Dr. Broderick Chosen

John A. Barry and Frank X. Jennings Lost Nomination at Liberal Convention.

At the convention of the Liberal Association held in Moose Hall, yesterday evening, Lt.-Gov. Wm. Pugsley and Dr. W. P. Broderick were selected as the candidates of the Liberal party to contest the riding of St. John and Albert. Six names were put in nomination, namely: Dr. A. F. Emery, Lt. Gov. Wm. Pugsley, Dr. W. P. Broderick; Frank B. Ellis, Frank X. Jennings and John A. Barry. Dr. Emery, who was present, asked that his name be withdrawn; and the name of Frank B. Ellis was also withdrawn after he had been consulted over the telephone following a query by Premier Foster as to whether or not he desired that his name should go before the convention. Fred Belyea read a letter from H. R. McLean requesting that his name be not placed before the delegates.

The surprise of the evening was the nomination of Frank X. Jennings by Premier Foster, who declared that as it was understood that one of the candidates should be a Roman Catholic, he proposed the name of Mr. Jennings. Several rumors were circulated to the effect that in the event of his not receiving the endorsement of the Liberal party, Mr. Barry would run as a Labor candidate. It was quite evident throughout the proceedings that a division still exists in the ranks of the Liberal Association; and it was referred to by Dr. Broderick in his speech of acceptance when he declared that he was surprised at the manifestation of this continued "split" at the convention.

Fred N. Thompson, of Hillsboro, acted as chairman of the convention, and E. J. Henneberry was secretary.

**The Nominations.**  
Upon nominations being called for Dr. E. J. Ryan proposed the name of Dr. A. F. Emery, who, in withdrawing, proposed that of Lt. Governor Pugsley, which was seconded by J. Fred Belyea. Dr. W. P. Broderick was nominated by Michael Kelly, and Louis McDonald seconded the nomination. The third name to be proposed was that of Frank B. Ellis, S. S. Ryan, of Albert, was the proposer and A. J. Stevens the seconder. John T. O'Brien nominated John A. Barry, which was seconded by Dr. A. F. Emery.

Premier Foster asked Mr. Ryan if he had any assurance that Mr. Ellis would run and after some discussion it was subsequently ascertained that the nominee did not desire his name to go before the convention. Premier Foster then declared that, as a delegate and a member of the Liberal party, he had a further name to propose. He referred to the "split" which had existed in the ranks of the Liberal party since 1917, and he hoped that the man he had in mind would bring the two factions together. Sometimes when a division occurred in the ranks a compromise was effected. The question of religion had apparently arisen which he regretted. He was prepared to accept the principle that one of the candidates should be a Roman Catholic. He had in mind a man of thirty-one years of age, whom he considered would make a good candidate, and he, therefore, proposed the name of Frank X. Jennings, which was seconded by Jacob Stevens.

The following scrutineers were then appointed by the chairman, A. N. McLean, Wm. Carney, Jos. O'Brien, Arthur McQuisley and H. Keith. Before the distribution of the ballots Horace A. Porter brought up the question of a delegate should be permitted to vote for one man only, and he voiced the opinion that each delegate should place the names of two candidates and not one on his ballot. Considerable discussion occurred on this point and it was decided that this suggestion would not be insisted upon.

**The First Ballot**  
The result of the first ballot gave Pugsley 175, Broderick 75, Jennings 54 and Barry 53. Lt. Governor Pugsley was then declared elected as one of the candidates of the Liberal party and Mr. Barry was eliminated. The contest for the second nomination narrowed down to a contest between F. X. Jennings and Dr. Broderick, and upon the second ballot being taken the vote stood 119 for Broderick and 77 for Jennings. The chairman then announced that Dr. Broderick had been elected as the other candidate of the party.

When, however, J. Fred Belyea, who had succeeded Mr. Thompson as chairman owing to his early departure to make train connections, proceeded to nominate a committee of five to wait upon Lt. Gov. Pugsley and Dr. Broderick and included the name of John A. Barry, Mr. Barry asked that his name be left off such a committee. The chairman then inquired if he had not seconded the resolution to make the nomination unanimous, but Mr. Barry explained that he had not. He also stated that he owed a certain amount to certain labor elements in his constituency and he was not free until he had conferred with them. The motion was then seconded by the acting secretary, E. J. Henneberry.
