LEGISLATIVE

REFORMS WHICH LABOR DESIRES

every three months to declare the cost of living in the various parts of the Province.

4. The existing Boards of Welfare in Cities and Municipalities shall be recognized by the Government, and similar Boards formed in Municipalities where such do not at the present time exist, to which Boards any parent who can prove to the Board his or her inability to earn, or the fact that he or she is not receiving the proper income to meet the "proper cost of living" for himself or herself or his or her family, could appeal for the necessary sum to make up the deficit, which sum would be granted to such parent from the consolidated revenue funds of the Province as his or her dues of the State.

5. It shall also be the duty of the Boards of Welfare and the Municipalities involved to obtain free medical treatment, in the home or the hospital, both in the case of the mother and in the case of any child where the expense of such medical treatment would cause the income of the family to fall below the proper "cost of living" and similarly to provide for the fullest education for all children in the community.

6. No mother shall be expected to work, except at her own household duties, while she has any children under twelve years of age, nor shall any child under the age of eighteen years be permitted to work in order to enlarge the family income.

7. In the case of the desertion or permanent incapacity, or death of the husband, any mother, who shall satisfy the Welfare Board that her income is insufficient, shall be entitled to the difference between her income and the "proper cost of living" both for herself and for her children until the education of the children is completed. In the case of the desertion of a husband by his wife the amount paid by him in wages to the bringer up of his children shall be taken into account by the Board of Welfare in judging his ability to earn the proper "cost of living." It shall be the constant endeavor of the Welfare Boards to preserve the family life in every possible case.

8. Nothing in this Act shall be held to restrain the provisions of the Delinquent Children's Act, the Workmen's Compensation Act or the Factories Act except in so far as definite change is ordered herein.

9. Any person committing any fraud on this Act shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding Ten Dollars (\$10) or imprisonment not exceeding one month.

Amendments to Public Health Act.

1. No wall, partition or ceiling of any room in any tenement house, hotel or dwelling shall be re-papered, calcimined or have any other covering placed thereon unless the old wall paper or other covering shall have first been removed therefrom and the said wall, partition or ceiling cleaned, disinfected and freed from bugs, insects or vermin.

2. Provisions that will prohibit the use of tents or bunk-houses in camps, which have been instituted for the conduct of business permanently located, as sleeping or boarding places for workmen.

3. Provision for the cleanliness of temporary camps, with proper air space in sleeping quarters, also that beds or bunks shall be of sanitary material constructed so as to afford reasonable comfort to persons occupying same.

Provision for cleanliness of cook cars, which must be supplied with ice during warm months so as to assure that all foods, which must be of a good quality, will be kept in a fit condition.

4. Provision for a penalty of not less than \$100 nor more than \$200 or imprisonment of not more than 60 days being imposed against owners, managers, agents, firms or corporations who violate or allow to be violated the provisions of this Act as it applies to camps.

An Act relating to Printing, Bindery and Stationery Work, defining the Powers and Duties of Public Officers in regard thereto, and Providing a Penalty for the Violations of Provisions thereof.

1. All printing, bindery and stationery work, executed for or on behalf of the Provincial Government and its various departments, for which the said Government contracts shall be executed within the Province of Alberta, except as provided in the following section:

2. No representation shall be made to publishing firms without the province as to contemplated contracts for printing, book-binding and stationery work, unless at the same time tenders are called for from all publishing concerns in the province; and no such contract shall be awarded outside the province unless the contract figures of all concerns within the province are greatly in excess of figures quoted by concerns without the province:

3. All printing, bindery and stationery work to be executed for or on behalf of any municipality or schoolboard within the province and its various departments, for which said municipality or schoolboard district contract, shall be executed within said municipality or school district by tender, except as provided in the following section:

4. No representation shall be made to publishing firms without the municipality or school district as to contemplated contracts for printing, book-binding and stationery work unless at the same time tenders are called for from all publishing concerns in the municipality or school district unless the contract figures of all concerns within the municipality or school district are greatly in excess of figures quoted by concerns without the municipality or school district.

General Labor News

Items of Interest for Free Press Readers

Officers of the International Brotherhood of Bookbinders report a good standing membership of 21,539 on December 10th last.

Editor Cooke of the Chattanooga Labor World inquires: "Which strike caused the price of sugar to go from 10 cents to 22½ cents a pound?"

The Glass Blowers' Union of San Francisco reports that it has expelled a member from the union for having taken the place of one of the shipyard workers on strike.

Toronto Building Trades have denounced the "Labor Leader," a so-called Labor paper of that city, for its action in opposing Labor candidates in the municipal elections who had been jointly endorsed and backed by the trades unions and Independent Labor Party.

Low pay drove 1,500 teachers out of the New York public schools during 1919, according to figures made public recently by W. L. Ettinger, superintendent of schools. Mr. Ettinger declared that teachers were resigning every day, and in many schools classes were being hampered by lack of instructors.

It is reported that the Manitoba provincial government is now framing necessary legislation in order to introduce the system of proportional representation at the coming elections in that province.

The legislative committee of the legislative assembly of Quebec has killed the bill introduced by Henry Miles, M.P.P. for St. Lawrence, Montreal, which proposed the admission of women to the bar.

As the street railways have ceased operation owing to the lack of coal, the taxicab drivers of Vienna have gone on strike for increased fares.

Any provincial, municipal or school official who violates any of the above provisions, either as an officer, member of board, department or council, or purchasing agent shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof before a police magistrate, or justice of the peace, shall be fined in a sum not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100) nor more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) for each offence, and shall be liable upon his official bond, if any, for the amount of every contract entered into in violation of this Act.

An Act Respecting Injunctions in Trade Disputes.

1. In this Act the expression "trade dispute" means any dispute.

(a) Between employers and workmen; or

(b) Between workmen and workmen; which is connected either directly or indirectly (a) with the employment or non-employment, or the terms of employment, or with the conditions of labor, of any person, or with the refusal by any person or persons to do or perform any particular work or service; or

(c) Employed in trade or industry. Whether or not in the employment of the employer with whom a trade dispute arises.

2. No restraining order or injunction, whether interlocutory or permanent, shall, in any case of a trade dispute, be issued or granted by any Court, or Judge thereof, to restrain or prohibit any person or persons, or trade union, whether singly or in concert:

(a) From terminating any relation of employment; or

(b) From ceasing to perform any work or labor; or

(c) From recommending, advising or persuading others, by peaceful means to do or refrain from doing anything mentioned in clauses (a) and (b); or

(d) From attending at or near a house or place where any such person or persons may lawfully be for the purpose of peacefully obtaining or communicating information, or of peacefully persuading any person or persons to work or to abstain from working or for any other purpose enumerated in this section; or

(e) From ceasing to patronize or to employ any person, persons, company or corporation, or from recommending, advising, or persuading others by peaceful and lawful means so to do; or

(f) From paying or giving to, or withholding from, any person or persons any strike benefits or other monies, or things of value; or

(g) From peacefully assembling in a lawful manner and for lawful purposes; or

(h) From doing any act or thing which might lawfully be done in the absence of lawful dispute by any party thereto; (1) nor shall any of the acts specified in this section (2) nor the agreement by two or more persons to do or perform or to refrain from doing any such acts, be considered or held to be contrary to law.

3. An act done by a person in contemplation or furtherance of a trade dispute shall not be actionable on the ground only that it induces some other person to break a contract of employment or that it is an interference with trade, business or employment of some other person, or with the right of some other person to dispose of his capital or his labor as he wills.

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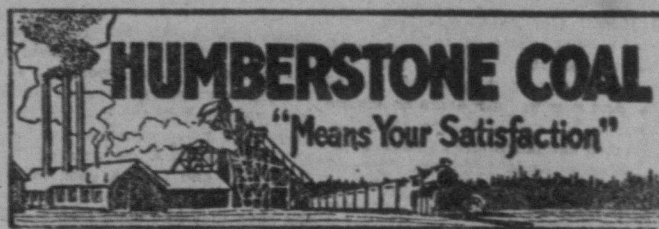
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
