The regular Matriculation Examination begins on the day named in the Calendar.

Candidates for Matriculation will be required to pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects:

- I. Latin. Cæsar, Gallic War, Book I.; or Books II and III.; Vergil's Æneid, Book I.; Cicero, two Orations against Catiline, or the Manilian Law; Latin Grammar (Harkness' is preferred); Smith's Principia Latina, Part IV: Exs. 1–25, or the equivalent.
- II. Greek. Dr. Smith's Initia Greea, Part I.; Xenophon, Anabasis, Book I.; or Book IV.; Greek Grammar (Hadley's or Goodwin's is preferred.)
- III. Mathematics. Arithmetic; Algebra to the end of Quadratic Equations; Geometry, as in Hamblin and Smith, Books I.-IV. (inclusive), or the equivalent thereof.
- IV. English. Grammar, Writing from Dictation; and a short composition upon a subject drawn from one of the following works: Shakespeare's Julius Cæsar, and Merchant of Venice; Longfellow's Evangeline; Macaulay's Lays of Ancient Rome. The composition must be exact in expression, division into paragraphs, punctuation, and spelling.
- V. French. 23 chapters in Otto's Grammar, or an equivalent.
