SPECIAL "O" TO THE RESCUE While conducting surveillance during a narcotics investigation, in a small picturesque town on the southern shore of Nova Scotia, two members of the "H" Division Special "O" team came were involved in a daring rescue.



The mid-November day had begun with warnings of high winds and heavy rains, and by 11 o'clock, a blustery nor'easter howled across the province, with winds from 50-148 km/h being registered.
