McRAE'S, WARDSVILLE

Wardsville Pioneer Dies.

Wardsville, Feb. 2.—The death of Mrs. Wm. Sheppard removes a link with the pioneer days of this section. A daughter of the late Major Sparling, she was born in 1835. Her early school days were spent in the first school opened in this locality on the "big bend" of the River Thames. In 1854 she was married to Wm. Sheppard at the homestead which occupied the site of the present residence of her nephew, Harry Sparling. The 60 years of her married life were spent in Wardsville. Up to the time of the "big fire" Mr. and Mrs. Sheppard lived in a house where now stands the town hall.

Besides Mr. Sheppard, two daughters and six sons survive. They are:

Ella M., at home; Lillian M., of Windsor; Fred W. and J. Russell, of St. Louis; Clayton B. and Carl E., of Detroit; Albert J., of Wardsville, and H. Cecil, of Cleveland. Mrs. Jas. Clark, of Melbourne, is a sister. A complete record of the family has been kept. The first entry was made in the year 1805 and continues to the present time.

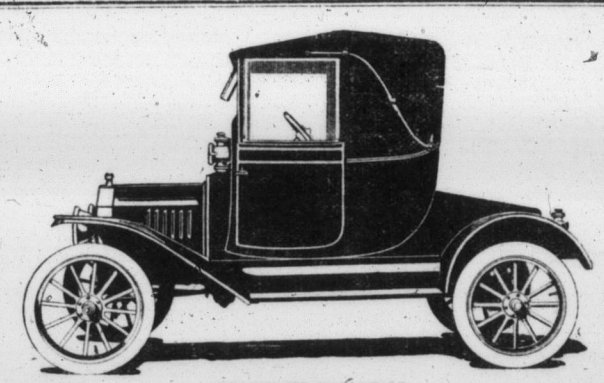
