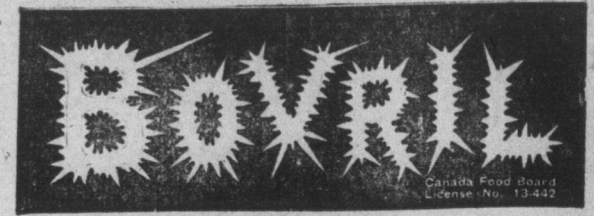

the Psalms of David. It might be permitted (although these modern theologians appear to put very little value on what the scripture says, on this question of stimulants) to mention what the prophet Samuel says, when describing conditions at this time: "And when David was a little past the top of the hill, behold, Ziba the servant of Mephibosheth met him, with a couple of asses saddled, and upon them two hundred loaves of bread and a hundred bunches of raisins and a bottle of wine. And the King said unto Ziba, what meanest thou by these? And Ziba said, The asses be for the King's household to ride on, and the bread and summer fruit for the young men to eat, and the wine that such as be faint in the wilderness may drink. Now the prophet Samuel may have been somewhat ancient, nevertheless his mental conception as well as spiritual discernment were fully developed, as was proven by Saul when he persuaded the Witch of Endor to call up Samuel from the tomb and give him direction what to do in his extremity. The direction given by the prophet and the information imparted were both absolutely correct and true, and this is the source from whence the quotation "And the wine, that such as be faint in the wilderness may drink."

Knowledge we are informed is a clear and certain perception of that which exists, or of truth and fact. Shakespeare says, "Ignorance is the curse to God, knowledge the wing wherewith we fly to heaven." No doubt that the injudicious use of liquor has been a source of harm and accidents, and in some instances may have led to crime but the careless and ignorant use of electricity or any other useful element will also, and in disaster if proper judgment is ignored. One thing quite common is, for every little crime to be attributed to liquor, and in the majority of instances liquor never was near the scene at all. In proof of this statement we may be allowed to observe that the county jail has now nineteen prisoners, seventeen of them for criminal offences, which is an abnormal number, and no whiskey allowed to be sold in the county. This leads us to enquire whether these prohibitions, no matter whether voluntary or enforced, are any better, more honest and reliable than the ordinary citizen or are the parties created by enforced prohibition, superior to those examples of sobriety generated by common sense and moderation? Just look at the actual conditions to-day, because a citizen effects every external indication of being a sincere sympathizer with prohibition, yet this is no reason why you should expect him not to smoke or chew tobacco, he might use profane language too, without his prohibition proclivities suffering in the least.

It is really somewhat mysterious, how this grade of intelligence can make themselves subject to such calamitous misery, because some fellow citizen partakes of a little beverage of the kind the prophet Samuel reports, "that such as be faint in the wilderness may drink," without any manifestation of displeasure at their brethren for chewing tobacco, or lying, or ignoring the sixth commandment, that don't hurt a bit. Now doesn't it seem as if this kind of creature was replete with crude and unwholesome conceptions and totally destitute of organic harmony, but rather made up of a whole congre-



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tion of inconsistencies and deplorable angularities. It might be said to be uncharitable to criticise these philosophers too severely, but we do say distinctly that if our ideas and words were distinctly weighed and duly considered, they would afford quite a preferable kind of logic to that invented by your correspondents.

There is another phase to this prohibition question, which is seldom or ever discussed and involves a fundamental principle. There has been a recognized liquor license system in legal control and operation in this province up to the war prohibition regulation. This system encouraged the erection and construction of suitable buildings and plant, to carry on the business for which the license board exacted a license fee. No licensee would ever think of expending money on the improvement of his property without first obtaining the approval of the license board. Thus we may say that the improvements referred to were always made with the sanction of, and often at the request of the license board. Now without discussing the question of prohibition at all, is it right after encouraging a man to use his time and expend his money for a certain purpose and take pay from him by way of license, then shut down square on him and make him be the loser of the whole plant which he constructed for license purposes? Now Sir, what little gossip comes our way regarding your correspondent we mean those who have sufficient dignity to subscribe their names, is of a favorable nature and christian charity suggests that we render them all due credit, but if they possess sufficient bigotry to advocate so unjust a transaction in connection with their prohibition campaign, as the one described, then it will certainly be quite proper to establish a line of demarcation between their professions and their virtues.

A nobler principle was exhibited in the reign of King William the 4th when the change was made in the constitution of the British West India colonies, by the total abolition of negro slavery, and a compensation of

twenty million sterling was granted to the proprietors of the slaves. If the United States had followed the example set, they might have bought up all the slaves in the south, with a fraction of the money that the war cost, as well as saved the lives of those who perished in the conflict and have evaded the bitterness of feeling which is so hard to erase, engendered by the agony and violence always present at war. No doubt we all recognize the term fact, that this country is destined to progress; and an eye single to this fact should be the ruling element in the discussion of all public questions.
