Imme to Haifax, N.S., in 1856, and after two years' sidence there removed to Charlottetown, P.E.I., where he remained until May, 1862, when he settled in B.C. Is merchant and insurance agent. Was connected with the Vol Militia from 1859 until 1875, when he entered the Esserve Militia. Apptd. Lieut. Col. 1879. Was a mem. of the City Council, 1872-79, and Mayor of Victoria for three years from 1879. First returned to Leg. Assem. at p., 1886, and re-elected at g. e., 1890 and 1894. Apptd.
