For a religious program, or a program whose theme it is to make comments on a societies' morals, to be a success, it has to arouse the listeners emotions, and after the show is over, leave him something to think about. And this Ama . in Grace does superbly. The greatest thing the show has going to:

that it speaks directly to the audience. That is, the show gives the impression of God talking to you, without the aid of human interpreters, as is the case with a lot of programs along these lines. You don't get, "The Lord said, 'Go ye and teach among the nations'." but, "Go ye and teach among the nations."

The use of "God and his Executive Board" goes a long way in facilitating this.

Annuer aspect of the show is the contrast and quick changes which take place. For example, the devil says. "Did you recognize my old friend last, or are you more acquainted with pride," which is immediately followed by the song, 'You're so vain, you probably think this song is about you." This is doneunannouncedAn even better example is, in the same show in which the above quotation is taken, there is a skit where two people are fighting over some candy. This dies out, and is followed by "Did those two sound familiar, or are you more of a glutton." Then, again unannounced, you find yourself hit with, "The Candy Man."

This contrast is best seen by the hymn which opens the show, which gives anything but an indication of the format the show will take. They make effective use of blending music and commentary for this

purpose.
Also, it must be remembered that each show is different from the one previous in both content and format, so that is impossible to know what to expect. Each show has its given theme. For example, one show might give a skit about what one's arrival at the pearly gates will be like, where another one will be making thought-provok ing comments on the attitudes taken towards and treatment afforded senior citizens.

With respect to format changes, the Devil will be introducing his

friends, the Seven Mortal Sins one cek, while we will be listening to st. Peter tell the Baron (or you, if you see yourselves in those shows). where she can go if she doesn't like the set up. Or, you might get the chance to listen in on Miss Harper talking about the plight of her aged

It should be noted that they don't usually come right out and say -"This is what we are trying to tell you." They leave that up to the listener. However, by the time the show is over, which ends as quickly as it begins, you should get the point, if you've been listening at

They seem to have a knack for questioning things which people take for granted as being the accepted way of doing things. For example, they questioned the morals behind presenting gold watches to retiring employees, or en the morals behind the whole

idea of a retirement age. And, they also manage to tie the whole thing in directly with the audience. In 'his instance, you are reminded that you too, one day, will be 65

There is one criticism I wo d like to make. The creators go to a lot of trouble to point out the faults and injustices in our society However, they could go a little ways to show that there are also a few "good things" happening, and there are a few "good people" in the world. Giving them a little credit might give the listeners an example to follow. This might be a little more constructive than simply pointing out the faults. This does not imply any real change in the theme or format of the show. be it might be kind of nice to hear After all, the world isn't all bad, is

So, in summation, I would say hat "Amazing Grace" is well worth the half-hour it takes to listen to it, and I would recommend that, if you are on campus next Tuesday at 9:00 p.m. to tune in.
