MARCH.—Respecting frequent ploughing for wheat, a practical farmer says: If any one will break his ground deeply and thoroughly two or three times during the spring and summer, the extra amount of wheat per acre will pay for ploughing, and leave a handsome profit besides. I have tested this prac-tice several times with most satisfactory results. A field of sixteen acres I broke in spring, and ploughed the half again on the twentieth of June. On the first of September, following, I ploughed again the entire field, and sowed in wheat. The half that had only received a single ploughing yielded 13 bushels and 18 pounds; the half that had received three breakings yielded per acre 23 bushels and 40 pounds. At one dollar a bushel this would pay for the extra ploughing, and leave a net extra profit of six dollars per acre
