## MARKET REVIEW AND FORECAST

Toronto, Monday, March 11, 1912.—"When  
is the price of meat, butter, eggs and vari-  
ous other lines of food stuffs that we  
people have to buy going to stop in-  
crease? This is an inquiry  
which is now heard on every hand every  
day. Prices on many lines of farm pro-  
ducts are now much greater than the  
prices of our cities can really  
afford to pay, say the retail dealers. We  
on the farmers' side of the question can-  
not see where prices will be able to go  
below present levels and leave us a living  
profit. This economic question is becom-  
ing more pressing every year. It was  
never more pressing than it is in Toronto  
at the present time. A review of the pro-  
duce markets for the past week shows  
that the consumer will be relieved some-  
what on the price of eggs, but practically  
all lines remain stationary at last week's  
figures.

Trade has been fairly good for the  
season of the year, but does not show any  
great increase over trade for the same  
time last year. Many manufacturing es-  
tablishments are only running at half  
time. Business men, however, look for a  
better volume of trade when the spring  
opens up.

## WHEAT

The wheat situation continues strong  
and prices on hand wheat have advanced  
one-half a cent. The decrease in the  
world's wheat crop renders the market  
secure against all attacks of scarcity and  
any great reduction is practically impos-  
sible. The feature of the market this  
week has been the stronger demand from  
the old country. No. 1 Northern is quoted  
\$1.12 1/2; No. 2, \$1.10 1/2; No. 3, \$1.06 1/2;  
Manitoba feed wheat, 75c. Ontario winter  
wheat has been practically the only grain  
moving among dealers here. The ruling  
price is 96c to 97c, car lots outside.

The market for coarse grains could not  
well be quieter. Practically no grain of  
any description has changed hands this  
week outside of fall wheat. Quotations  
on rye in particular are purely nominal.  
Dealers quote as follows: Barley, malting,  
85c to 90c; feed, 75c to 78c; oats, C.W.,  
No. 2, \$1.15; No. 3, 85c; Ontario, No. 2,  
45c to 46c outside, 43c to 44c here; No. 3, 1c  
less; corn, 72 1/2c; peas, 81c to 82 1/2c;  
buckwheat, 67c to 68c; rye, 81c to 82c.  
At Montreal the principal demand  
is for feed oats. Quotations are as fol-  
lows: C.W., No. 2, 55c to 56 1/2c; No. 3,  
53c to 54 1/2c; No. 2, local, 60 1/2c to 61c;  
No. 3, 49 1/2c to 50c; No. 4, 48 1/2c to 49c;  
corn, 71 1/2c; barley, malting, 81c to  
82c; buckwheat, 72c to 73c.

## MILL STUFFS

Mill stuffs are scarce all over Eastern  
Canada and prices have advanced another  
dollar in the past week. Manitoba bran  
is quoted at 82c, shorts, 82c; Ontario bran,  
82c, shorts, 82c. At Montreal bran is  
quoted at 82c, shorts, 82c, and middlings,  
82c.

## HONEY

Wholesale quotations remain unchanged.  
Strained honey is 10c to 11c in 60-lb. tins,  
11c to 12c in 5 to 10-lb. tins; buckwheat  
honey, 1c to 1 1/2c in 5-lb. tins, 1 1/2c in barrels.  
No. 1 comb honey, 1c to 1 1/2c to 2 1/2c a dozen.

## SEEDS

Dealers are paying the following prices:  
Red clover No. 1, \$1.10; No. 2, \$1.05;  
\$1.10; Alsike No. 1, \$1.10; No. 2, \$1.05;  
No. 1, \$1.10; Timothy No. 1, \$1.10; No. 2,  
\$1.05.

## FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

The local market for apples is steady.  
Quotations are: Greenings, No. 1, \$3.25

a barrel; No. 2, \$2.75; Baldwin, No. 1,  
\$3.50; No. 2, 75c; cooking varieties, \$2.50  
to \$3.00. Quotations for various apples are as  
follows: \$1.50 to \$1.75; cabbage, \$2.50  
a barrel. On the retail market apples are  
sold at \$1.50 a barrel, and cabbage, 50c  
to 60c a dozen.

## HIDES AND WOOL

The market for hides is steady at last  
week's declining. Prices paid by country  
merchants are: Hides, cured, 12c  
to 11 1/2c; green, 10c to 10 1/2c; lambs and  
pullets, 10c to \$1.00; hides, 45c to 50c;  
No. 6, calf skins, 15c to 16c. City  
quotations are: No. 1, 11 1/2c; No. 2,  
10 1/2c; No. 3, 9 1/2c; calf skins, 14c to 15c;  
unwashed wool is quoted at 15c to 16c;  
washed, 10c to 12c; reject, 15c.

## POTATOES AND BEANS

Irish, Ontario and Maritime potatoes all  
feature in the local market. From the  
consumers' point of view, Irish potatoes are  
come in well in that they steady the  
market and keep prices from going away  
too high. Dealers are quoting \$1.50 to \$1.75  
a bag in car lots and \$1.75 out of store.  
Delaware are at a 10c premium. At Mon-  
tréale potatoes are quoted at \$1.50 to \$1.75  
in car lots.

Beans are quoted at \$2.25 to \$2.30 for  
prince and \$2.50 to \$2.60 for hand picked.  
At Montreal three-pound pickers are \$2.15  
to \$2.17.

## EGGS AND POULTRY

There has been a big drop in the price  
of eggs. Quotations have declined almost  
10c in the past week, and dealers are now  
offering 50c to 55c a dozen in case lots.  
The retail price is 50c to 55c. At Montreal,  
also prices are down, and the wholesale  
price of fresh eggs is 30c to 35c.  
Whole sale quotations for dressed poultry  
are as follows: Chickens, 12c to 14c  
a lb.; fowl, 7c to 10c; turkeys, 12c to 15c;  
ducks, 12c to 14c; geese, 15c to 18c. On  
the retail market farmers are selling  
chickens at 12c to 15c; fowls, 10c to 12c;  
turkeys, 15c to 20c; ducks, 15c to 18c, and  
geese, 15c to 18c.

## DAIRY PRODUCE

Creamery prints are up another cent.  
So slack is the supply of really good but-  
ter everywhere that there is nothing to  
prevent dealers from asking almost any  
price for their goods. Present high prices  
cannot hold much longer, however, as the  
dairy season is opening here in Canada  
and the United States. Quotations now  
are: Dairy prints, 30c to 35c; creamery  
prints, 35c to 40c; solids, 24c to 26c, and in-  
terior, 30c to 35c. On the Farmers' Mar-  
ket choice dairy butter sells at 30c to 35c,  
Cheese is quoted at 17c to 17 1/2c for twins,  
12 1/2c to 14c for large.

## HORSES

An average of prices on the local ex-  
change is about as follows: Heavy draft,  
\$200 to \$250; med. weight, \$170 to \$200;  
agricultural, good, \$150 to \$200; fair, \$100  
to \$150; saddlers, \$100 to \$275; delivery  
horses, \$150 to \$225; drivers, \$125 to \$300.

## LIVE STOCK

Trade at the stock yards has been re-  
markably quiet and sellers have been no  
price changes worth noting in the past  
week. Trade on the Monday market was  
somewhat livelier than in the week pre-  
vious, but not sufficiently so to justify a  
higher quotation. Better price, however,  
was looked for later in the week, but  
heavy shipments depressed trade and  
prices had to stay where they were. In
