Austria has Trouble With War Loan and no Substantial Increase is Shown

### BOMBARDED KARLSRUHE

German Statement Says Allies' Aviators Killed -U. S. State Department Said to be Victim of German Hoax.

The Austrian war loan does not show any substan tial increase in spite of great pressure and advertise ment. Czech nobles and great industrial firms who were represented in the first war loan only with amounts of \$5,000 to \$10,000 have now subscribed amounts up to \$200,000, and in one case \$1,000,000. The old Emperor, to set the example, subscribe twice very large amounts, and all members of the MR. ÆMILIUS JARVIS SECURES Royal Family fellowed his lead. Yet it seems to be of no avail, for though no official statement has yet Leen published, it is generally known that the war loan does not exceed \$300,000 and

German army headquarters made the following cement yesterday:-

"Yesterday the open town of Karlsruhe, which is far from the theatre of operations, and not in any way fortified, was attacked with bombs dropped by hostile airmen. So far as is now known, some 11 citizens were killed and six injured. Military damage could not have been caused. The New York Tribune is responsible for the statement that Dr. Anton Meyer-Gerhard, German Red Cross lecturer and Count von Bernstorif's special envoy to the Imperial Government, who landed yester day in Christiania, Norway, has perpetrated a giganhoax on the State Department of the United States, according to evidence now in the hands of that paper. It alleges that he is none other than Dr. Alfred Meyer, privy councillor of the first rank, chief of the Department of Army Supplies of the Imperial German Ministry of War. The real Dr. Anton Meyer-Gerhard has not been out of Germany since the beginning of the war, and has been reported among the wounded on the east front. The much advertised Red Cross propaganda was a farce. Dr. July 16. Meyer came to purchase such war supplies as he could obtain, and, incidentally, to learn the condition of military preparedness of the States. He takes to the German War Office information of great importance, which he has gathered in his dealings with various munition brokers and manufacturers

Ge: man attempts to bombard London from aircraft were brought formally to the attention of the United States Government yesterday by Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, the British Ambassador. No request for a protest was made. After referring to the growing fre quency of raids in sections of London by hostile aeronauts. Sir Cecil declared that the great city was practically unfortified; absolutely so far as the resi-dential sections were concerned. Millions of people were crowded in congested quarters, he said, and it would be impossible for British artillery men to defend these sections against aeroplanes or Zeppelii attacks, because any shells sent into the sky towards airciaft almost certainly would work great destruction of life when their fragments returned to the earth in the crowded city. The ambassador also pointed out that a large number of Americans and other non-English people are resident in London, and that located there are the foreign embassies and legalons, and many hospitals and charitable institutions all of which are greatly endangered by the Zeppelin
