THE SENATE UNDER FIRE

Mr. Findlay, M. P., for South Bruce, Progressive, says he will move at the next session of Parliament for a plebiscite on the proposal to make the Senate elective, or, as an alternative, to end it.

The constitution of the Senate was seriously and exhaustively discussed in the pre-Confederation debates. The elective principle was opposed by the Fathers on the ground that it would make the Second Chamber as powerful as the House of Commons, and that the existence of two Houses of co-ordinate rank and with the same elective basis would not tend to smooth working of the new Governmental machinery.

The appointment of Senators by Provincial Legislatures was not overlooked in the examination of methods, but Parliament had fresh in mind the experience of the United States before the Civil War, and the plan it adopted conformed to the desire to make the Canadian Federal system more centralized than that which was temporarily disrupted in the Republic.

Probably Mr. Findlay will not press his resolution before he sees how the Government proposes to deal with the same question. The Premier and some of his colleagues have declared that the present irresponsible position of the Senate, used for obstructive purposes, is inconsistent with democratic principles of government, and that they intend to ask for a constitutional amendment which will assure the supremacy of the popular Chamber. It is inferred that they will frame a measure resembling the British Parliament Bill

which nearly fifteen years ago deprived the House of Lords of its absolute veto power. Whether changes in the method of choosing members of the Senate will be proposed or not is left to conjecture. It is certain that Senate reform has ceased to be only a matter for academic debate, and has become an issue in practical politics. The coming session will bring it to the front.
