ARTICLE ON SMOKED HADDOCK

"Good and Bad Smoked Haddock" is the caption of an article in the February number of the Canadian Fisherman by Dr. E. E. Prince, Dominion Commissioner of Fisheries. It describes fully the experiments being made in St. Andrews by two officers of the Biological Board, Messrs. Calder and Cross, in the preparation, curing and smoking of haddock, under instructions furnished by Miss Gair Patterson, M. A. pression. "Your king and country will bleed you," I have felt that little leniency should be shown, and that you deserve a severe and exemplary punishment.

I am disposed, however, to make some allowance for the condition of mind under which you labored and which, I have no doubt, was due to those pernicious, false expositions of doctrine or belief with which, most unfortunately, you have been feeding your intellect. These expositions, as you have understood them, have apparently engendered in you, as they are bound to do in time to engage in all men who accept them in like sense, a spirit of unreasoning discontent and distrust, which sees nothing but slaves in themselves and tyrants in all the rest of mankind.

These fruits of this teaching—this discontent, this distrust, this suspicion, this hate—are the tyrants which in reality enslave you. It is not your fellow-men who, by energy, by enterprise, by their own genius and labor and their own resources, find employment and wages for you, which you may or may not accept at your will and pleasure.

It is not the state which educates and entrains you, and gives you every conceivable degree of freedom, but it is those ideas themselves which, recognizing no benevolence, no public spirit, no patriotism, no usefulness, no excellence of any kind in others, in truth imprison you within yourselves and shut out from your vision the light of all inspiring and ennobling thought and feeling.

For your present difficulty, therefore, I blame to a large extent the dangerous teachings of which you have, unfortunately, become a misguided devotee, and I believe that you and others have already, by means of this prosecution, been taught a salutary lesson as to the trouble which such teaching breeds.

For these reasons and the fact that I understand that this is your first criminal offence in this country I shall not impose the penalty which otherwise I would have imposed.
