REGINA MEN DO WELL AT STOCK SHOW

SUCCESSFUL OPENING OF PROVINCIAL FAT STOCK SHOW.

Entries Well in Excess of Last Year—Fine New Building Draws Great Attention of Stock Men—Local Breeders Win Several Championships.

The Saskatchewan Fat Stock Show opened yesterday in the magnificent building erected by the city, under favorable conditions in most respects. The irregularity in the running of trains prevented considerable numbers who were expected to attend from being present, and many were, no doubt, deterred from starting by the fear of being snowed and being prevented from arriving in time. The number of entries is somewhat over the number last year, and the entries of swine are doubled. The judging of the fat stock took place yesterday, the judges being George Gray, of Newcastle, Ont., and J. Bracken, Winnipeg. They awarded the grade championship to Nell Martin, Regina, and the pure bred and grand championship to Robert Sinton, Regina, with Miss Prince. The quality of the exhibits was quite equal to what it was last year—perhaps not quite so uniform—but they included a number of highly commendable animals.

The judging took place under unusually comfortable conditions in the very excellent building provided by the city for the accommodation of the show. This building has been erected by the city, and it is whereof they speak to be easily the finest of its kind in Canada. It reflects very great credit on the enterprise and judgment of those who are responsible for its erection, but of those who planned and erected the building. One of its most distinctive features is the ample showing in the centre, large enough to accommodate a good sized class and to afford scope for showing horses in action on the line. This arena is surrounded on all sides with covered and amble and comfortably seats, affording even to those in the back seats an excellent view of the exhibits. The lighting is exceedingly well lighted in evening, the light being well diffused. Beneath the seats is a row of box stalls on each side of the arena, connected through a passage directly with the arena, thus enabling exhibitors to bring their animals from the stalls into the ring without taking them outside and exposing them to the weather and to the mud and stuff. Opposite each box stall across the passageway is a small locker, for the accommodation of each exhibitor for his feed, blankets, harness, and other equipment, which may be kept clean and free from interference. Each of these lockers might, if it were so desired, be used by the attendant as a sleeping room, which is a very desirable feature. The building, although scarcely completed, is sufficiently far advanced to be used for this year's show. There are a few minor details to be completed, when this is done Regina can boast one of the best and most useful buildings in the Dominion.
