THE DYNAMITERS

Expect to Plead That Their Of-
fense was a Political One.And That They are American Citizens
—That, However, Will not
Save Them.

Washington, D. C., April 26.—The State Department has heard nothing further from Mr. Brush, the U. S. consul at Clifton, Ont., respecting the attempt to blow up the Welland Canal lock, and consequently no representations touching the nationality of the men now held under arrest on suspicion of complicity in the outrage have been received. Regarding the report that the prisoners intend to set up a claim to protection by the United States, on the ground that they are American citizens, and that the offense charged was political, it is said that such a plea would be of no service. It is true that if the perpetrators of the outrage had escaped to the United States and that the American national flag and the plea that their offense was political might be factors of great weight in the disposition of their case. But having been arrested in Canada, where the offense was committed, the men are subject to the operation of Canadian law, as if they were born Canadians, and if they are guilty their American nationality cannot save them from punishment, according to the views of officials here.

rifles. Dr. Horden said, in reply to
Mr. McCreary's statement to that ef-
fect, that if there were no cartridges,
as alleged, the officer commanding the
battalion was actively to blame. A
general order issued in 1898,
which the minister read, provided that
officers commanding battalions, shall
supply themselves with 50 rounds per
rifle, which must be at all times kept
at regimental headquarters.
