Laird drain and grievance, attached to an agreement signed by J. K. Laird in regard to the same; Wilson, Kerr & Pike—advice re Laird drain, also re sand on beach Lake Erie, also re J. Liddy damages.

March 5, 1902.—I hereby report that I met Dr. Tye today and he assured me that if we will only guard that grade that he will not ask any damages, although he has sustained serious damages to his horses. I have also to report that a man was killed on the G. T. R. Ry. today, the body lies at Collaris' where it will remain until Saturday. He is known and may be claimed by friends in Toronto. He committed suicide. Dr. Bray is not going to hold an inquest.—J. McCormick.

March 10th 1902.—To the Municipal council of Harwich, I beg leave to report as follows in regard to the snow blockade on the Creek road east of Bridge End complained of by Jas. Liddy. I instructed that the master to have the said road cleared out, the master informed me that the road was not blocked except a small drift that could be opened out in ten minutes, that he had done. I also drove over the road on the following day and found the road quite passible. And I would report in regard to the damages sustained by Jas. Liddy to his wagon that he be paid \$2.50 in full for damages arising from the accident upon the highway when the wagon slewed and the wheel broke, and without admission by the township of any liability in the highway.—J. McCormick.

Buchanan—Wilson.—That the above report be adopted.—Carried. Mr. Liddy being present refused the amount tendered in full for damages.

Buchanan—McCormick.—That Road divisions Nos. 34 and 101 be changed as follows: That portion of Div. No. 101 extending south across lot 2 be struck off said division, and that portion of Div. No. 34 across lots 3 & 4 be struck off this division, and that a new division be formed commencing at the line between lots 4 and 5 on the 4th con. line and extending southward to the Eau to be known as Division No. 34.—Carried.

Wilson—Bentley.—That the clerk ask for tenders for the township printing from the 2 Chatham papers and W. Baxter, of Chatham, the 2 Bloemhain papers and also from the 2 Ridgetown papers, said tenders to be in by next regular meeting of the council, April 14th, 1902.—Carried. Buchanan—McCormick.—That no action be taken in regard to the payment of the account for coal by J. L. Scott, furnished to George Everett.—Carried.

Wilson—Bentley.—That after hearing the evidence re Laird drain, resolved that no action be taken, as this council does not deem it advisable to take water out of its natural course as per the engineer's report. Moved in amendment by McCormick—Morrison, that the resolution passed on the 13th day of January, 1902 rejecting or refusing to adopt the report of W. G. McGeorge, engineer on the Laird drain be and the same is hereby rescinded and referred back to said engineer as this council will not adopt any report taking water out of its natural course.

The amendment being put was declared lost on the following division: Yeas—Morrison, McCormick, Nays—Buchanan, Bentley and Wilson. The motion being then put was declared carried on the following division: Yeas—Buchanan, Bentley and Wilson. Nays—Morrison and McCormick. Wilson—Bentley.—That the reeve and the mover be a committee to examine the Will's D. & W. which is under construction as the contractor has not sufficient fall for the tile and it is believed there is some mistake with the contractor's work or the engineer's profile.—Carried. Also that the resolution passed at a former meeting of this council instructing no member of this council to obtain any legal advice for the municipality without consent by resolution of council, be rescinded.—Carried.

To the Municipal council of Harwich. We beg leave to report as follows in regard to sand on Lake Erie beach near lot 1, that would not advise building a groin where suggested by Mr. D. Snobelen, but would advise that the motion passed on Oct. 30th be rescinded, and the taking of sand and stone from the beach be taken down.—Carried.

C. Buchanan, P. Morrison. Bentley—McCormick.—That the above report be adopted.—Carried. Bentley—McCormick.—That the matter of Mr. Liddy's bill be laid over till next meeting of council.—Carried.
