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DEFENCE HAS SURPRISE.

Trial of Mattie Perkins For Murder Begins This Week.

Cayuga, April 15.—Great interest is manifested here in the trial of Mrs. Mattie Perkins for the murder of her husband about Christmas time by means of strychnine poison.

It is said that some surprises will develop as the case expands.

The crown's present plans are to give the case to the grand jury on Tuesday. It is expected an indictment for murder will be returned that afternoon or on Wednesday. The trial starts immediately.

Line of Defence.

Medical evidence will be a feature of the proceedings, and it is learned that the defence will not put in much testimony to combat the crown's contention that poison produced death, but will almost admit this, centreing the legal battle on quite another feature of the case, which, it is inexpedient to the interests of both to make public now.

For one thing the crown will con-

For one thing the crown will contend that the accused purchased poison in Detroit, and it is believed the defence will try to show Mrs. Perkins never visited that city.

An Array of Experts.

WAS IT MURDER?

Blood-Stained Hatchet Found In the House of Koeller.

Stratford, April 15.—The case in which Leopold Koeller is charged with murder has taken a serious aspect. It is announced that a hatchet with blood-stains and flesh clinging to the blade has been found in an adjoining room to the apartment where the Dewing woman met her death.

The hatchet was found buried under a pile of clothing and along with other suspicious circumstances points strongly towards foul play having been committed.

The post-mortem examination was completed on Saturday afternoon, but the doctors, coroner and crown attorney refuse to divulge the result of the examination. It is alleged that an article which might have been used for an improper purpose was found on the floor of the deceased's room, but as it is in the possession of the foreman of the jury, nothing will like-ly be divulged in this connection un-til the evidence is taken at the ad-

The hypothesis is that the Dewing woman was dead before her body was burnt. But as the evidence thus far is merely circumstantial, the case is still shrouded in mystery.

MUTINY IN RUSS PRISON.

Seven Inmates Killed and Many Injured by Troops.

Riga, Russia, April 15.—There was a serious mutiny in the local prison on Saturday. Thirty-three inmates attacked and overcame the superintendent and wardens of the establish-

Troops were then summoned, and the conditions were such that they had to fire.

Seven of the mutineers were killed and 12 injured. Nine soldiers sustained wounds during the affray, which lasted an hour. The superintendent of the prison was badly beaten.
