Port Arthur, July 10.—The scrutiny of ballots in the Port Arthur and Rainy River election case commenced yesterday afternoon before Justice Teetzel of Toronto.

Up to 6 o'clock twenty-one votes cast for Kennedy had been counted out.

## AN OLD RESIDENT

Robert Griffith A Much Respected Man Passed Away Last Evening

A very esteemed and well known citizen passed away last night in the death of Robert Griffith, Sr. The death took place at his home on Adelaide street after a few weeks illness. Some days ago quite an improvement was noticed in his condition, and his recovery was hoped for, but on Saturday he took a turn for the worse, which terminated in his demise last night.

The late Robert Griffith was born in Belleville, Ont., and he was 63 years of age at the time of his death. He came to the Township of Dover when quite young, but subsequently moved to Chatham, where he had lived ever since. He was a highly valued foreman of construction work for Contractor Pook, of this city, and all his life had been a hard-working, earnest and straightforward citizen. He was a member of the Presbyterian church and a liberal in politics.

He leaves to mourn his loss a wife and the following children: Miss Fannie, of the Austin store; Mary, of Muskogee, Mich.; John, of Cleveland; William, of St. Thomas; Edward, local night operator for the G. T. R., and Robert, Jr., who is a salesman at the Thornton & Douglas store. One brother and four sisters survive him: Mrs. E. Hillman, of this city; Mrs. E. Windsor, of London; Mrs. J. Payne, of this city; Mrs. Albert Jahnke, of this city, and Edward, of Harwich.

The funeral will take place Thursday afternoon at 2.30 to Maple Leaf cemetery.

## TORONTO SCANDAL

Judge Winchester Makes Long Report to the City Council.

Toronto, July 10.—Judge Winchester reports his findings on the evidence in the city's civil scandals in 136 pages of typewriting, and it has been referred to the board of control and city council to take action on civil and criminal, as may be considered in the interests of the city.

The report finds that Elliott for Paddy Bros. paid Dr. Lynd a sum of money; that E. J. Lennox issued two false certificates of honor to J. J. McNamee; that he received \$100 on each occasion, that payments made by Mr. Dinnis and Mr. Rogers were made in consequence of his suggestions on behalf of Dr. Lynd, that presents were made by contractors to Mr. Lennox, and that the same were made to him by Bennett & Wright in return for favors; that the evidence shows that contractors charged the city much larger sums than were legitimate, that the two contracts for St. Lawrence market roof were obtained by fraud, and that Architects Siddall and Jarvis received \$200 and \$300 each from Douglas Bros.; that the Metallic Roofing Co. obtained the contract by fraud and that the city paid \$12,000 without receiving any consideration therefor; that \$300 was added to the tender of Metal Shingle and Siding Co. on Manufacturers' Building for which city received no consideration.
