CAUSE OF SUICIDES.

Every reader of the newspapers must have noticed the increase of suicide. Some of the cases, no doubt, are not so much cases of suicide proper as of euthanasia, that is, cutting short the pains of death. It cannot be thought that anyone whose case has been pronounced desperate, and who has made his will, is bound to be kept on the rack for a death of lingering torture. If Providence has sent the suffering, it has sent also the means of escape. But apparently there is an increase of suicide proper arising from intensified sensitiveness and a craving for happiness unfulfilled. There are many persons, it is to be feared, for whom life may seem not worth living, if this life is all. If the present life is not all, that materially alters the case. Otherwise all that can be said apparently is that the dark mood may pass away, that the future may have better things in store, that at all events life is short, and it is better to leave it without scandal. But commonplace of prudence such as these will not always prevail over the agony of despair.

The last case of suicide is that of a school girl of twelve, whose suicidal propensity is ascribed to the reading of demoralizing novels. This seems hardly possible in a child. That, novels, however, are becoming demoralizing is unhappily the experience of public librarians, and it is a case with which they have serious difficulty in dealing. Novel writing has of late been a lucrative, in some cases an immensely lucrative, trade. Novels and text-books, in fact, are said by publishers to be about the only things to which they can confidently look for profit. But creative genius is not common; and in order to manufacture a taking article recourse to other allurement is being had. Our great novelists, Scott, Miss Austen, Thackeray, Dickens, George Eliot, are pure, and for their purity we have much reason to be thankful. The great novelists of former days, such as Fielding and Smollett, now seldom read, are rather coarse than lascivious. The poison of these recent productions is more subtle. France is their mother country, and we owe her little thanks for her offspring. By-stander in Toronto said:

British Markets Steady.—Cattle Firm

London, Oct. 23.—Canadian cattle in the British markets are quoted at 10c to 11 1/2c per lb.; refrigerator beef, 8c to 9 1/2c per pound.

TORONTO LIVE STOCK.

Toronto, Oct. 23.—Receipts of live stock since last Friday, as reported by the railways, were 115 car loads, composed of 1757 cattle, 1100 hogs, 2272 sheep and lambs, with 101 calves.

Exporters.

None were offered, with the exception of a few shipping bulls, which sold at \$3.25 to \$4 per cwt.

Butchers.

There was a good demand for a few choice butchers, but outside this the market was dull and sluggish, with prices lower. Best butchers sold at \$4 to \$4.50; mixed, \$3.25 to \$3.50; common, \$2.50 to \$3; canners, \$1.25 to \$2.25.

Feeders and Stockers.

Receipts of feeders and stockers were large, too few of which were of the right kind. With the exception of a few of the best, prices were 10c to 15c per cwt. lower. H. Murby as usual was a heavy buyer at 10 to 15c per cwt. for feeders, 10 to 15c per cwt. for stockers, 60c to 80c per lb. at \$2.25 to \$2.50 per cwt. for common stockers, 50c to 70c per lb. at \$2 to \$2.50 per cwt.

Milk Cows.

There was a strong market for good choice milkers and forward springers. Over 70 cows were reported as being sold at \$38 to \$60 each.

Veal Calves.

Too many heavy horse calves and not enough of the right kind are being marketed. Prices rule about steady at \$5.50 to \$1 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs.

The market for sheep was about steady, while lambs were easier. The lower grades of sheep were easier. For the season thus far, export ewes sold at \$4.00 to \$4.50; lambs at \$5 to \$5.50 per cwt.

Hogs.

William Harris quotes the market unchanged at \$2.25 for select hogs, and \$2 for lights and fats, fed and watered.

TURKEY'S WAY OF RAISING REVENUE.

The land in all Turkey and her dependencies belongs to the reigning sultan and is only occupied at his will. It is divided among those who wish to cultivate it at a nominal rental of one-fifth of the produce, which goes directly to the crown. Three-fifths more are taken from the lessee on other pretexts, all for the maintenance of the government, the pasha in each district having the authority to lease the ground and collect the taxes, which may be in kind or money. If crops are short, they take four-fifths of all the man has in animals and even in household utensils, sometimes all his possessions, to make up the deficiency which Providence has withheld. Everything that can produce, be it a tree, beast, fowl, worm or the labor of a man and his family, is subject to the four-fifths tax. Those who toil at any labor or trade other than agriculture are taxed also pro rata according to their wages and must pay or go to prison.
