No doubt we should submit to be preached at without talking back, but the preacher goes beyond his text when he accuses The Citizen of "gloating." This paper reported in its news columns some months back the smiling and jaunty carriage of the provincial secretary, then the central figure of a scandal whose gravity would have sobered the average man even if he were innocent. In the case Mr. Stratton, with his "can't-youforget-some-things" record, his bear-ing was little short of an affront to the decencies of society. The man-mer was obviously assumed for effect and to impress the public with how little the matter appealed to his de-censitized feelings.
