SUBURBAN CREW WAS BLAMED

for Death of Harvey McDougall in the Derby Junction Smash-up

The enquiry into the death of Harvey McDougall, who was killed by a collision at Derby Junction on the I. C. R., on Thursday, March 9th, was brought to a close on the 16th and the jury brought in the following verdict: "We, the jury empaneled to enquire into the death of Harvey McDougall, find that the said Harvey McDougall came to his death by a collision of trains No. 31 and No. 59 at Derby Junction in the Parish of Derby, Northumberland county, on the morning of March 9th. We find further that the death of the said Harvey McDougall was due to the neglect of duty on part of the crew of train No. 59."

The inquest was resumed Wednesday. Driver Henry Cameron testified he had moved the branch train onto the main line on the brakeman's signal, presuming the latter had the conductor's authority. His train was off the main line four minutes before the collision. The semaphores were very little protection against trains going east. The duty of the conductor and driver was not to bring the train in ahead of time. They usually got to Derby Junction ahead of the regulations, although it was contrary to the regulations, as no time was allowed by the schedule for shunting, and they were expected to reach Newcastle on time. The time table gave sixty-six minutes between Millerton and Derby Junction for 4-29 miles. He could see the semaphore set at danger, when he went out on the main

He saw no one tamper with the semaphores.

Albert Forbes, the fireman, testified he got only the brakeman's signal for shunting. After the shunting he saw the switch open.

Station Master Atkinson said he did not reprove the branch train for coming in early. Rule 40 had not been observed at Derby Junction as to the west semaphore. It would require a man continually to apply it. He had instructions from Superintendent Price that Form 139 in rule 21 was not necessary regarding the branch train. The shunting that day was without his knowledge. He did not hear the shunting engine's bell. He had no opportunity to prevent the shunting.

Driver Cameron, recalled, said the bell had rung.

Driver Shaughnessy, of 31, swore he saw the semaphore down just before entering, and again on leaving the north bridge, but the next time it was up for danger. Had he seen the semaphore set for danger the first or second time he could have stopped in time to avert the disaster.

DIAMONDS DISCOVERED IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

Ottawa, March 16—The director of the geological survey announced that diamonds have been discovered by the survey in a British Columbia rock, the first recorded discovery of diamonds in Canada. The rock carrying the crystals is a peridotite of the variety known as dunite, consisting of elevelandite and chromite. The rock specimens in which the diamonds were found were collected by Mr. Charles Damsell, on Olivine Mountain, where Mr. Cassell has been making geological examination on behalf of the survey.
