DUNCAN R. McRAE, a farmer living at Elmdale, about four miles from Scotsburn, N. S., was found dead in the field on Tuesday last week, where he had been at work. Mr. McRae had been at work with a team digging a piece of ground, and during the day the dog arrived at the house alone. Search was made for Mr. McRae where he was found dead in the field, having apparently dropped dead while at work. The deceased was about 84 years of age.

At a Liberal Conservative convention held at O'Leary Station on Saturday last, Mr. F. J. Buote, editor and proprietor of the Impartial, Tignish, was unanimously chosen to contest the First District for the Legislative Assembly, at the election to be held on the 20th inst. It is to be hoped the electors of the First District will do themselves the honor of rallying to the support of Mr. Buote and triumphantly electing him on the 20th.

PROBABLY the largest canal in the world—a distinction of some note in these days of wonderful engineering feats—is the Chenab irrigation canal in the North-West Province of India. Its length is 200 miles, with a main channel some 450 miles long, while the principal branches have an aggregate length of 2,000 miles, and the village branches will extend, when completed, some 4000 miles. It is apart from irrigation, the longest canal in the world is that which extends from the frontier of China to St. Petersburg, and is 4472 miles in length. The Bengal canal, connecting with the river Ganges, is 900 miles long, and in all India there are 14,000 miles of canals, irrigating 3,000,000.

The cornerstone of the new church of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, at Piffers Point, was laid with solemn and appropriate ceremonies, by His Lordship, Bishop McDonald, on Sunday last. Prior to the laying of the corner stone, Solemn Pontifical Mass was celebrated by his Lordship, assisted by Rev. Donald McDonald, as high priest, Rev. S. Bonderault and John A. McDonald, as deacons of honor, E. Cormier and P. C. Gauthier, as deacon and sub-deacon of office, and I. R. A. McDonald, as master of ceremonies. A sermon in French was preached by Rev. E. Cormier of Memramook, and a sermon in English by Rev. John A. McDonald. In the cavity of the corner stone were placed a number of the current coins and newspapers, and the usual official episcopal statement. A collection of over \$270 was taken up.

McLaren, Prince Edward Island, late of Dundee, contributes to the summer number of the People's Journal a capital paper, entitled "Crossing the Capes, telling of an exciting adventure in the frozen North."
