Mr. John M. Farrow, mail clerk on the L. H. & B., and for some time past in the London hospital on account of an injured leg, is now able to be out, but is not yet able to attend to his duties.

Mr. John Hannah, Seaford, attended a very successful and interesting meeting of the Ontario Creamery Association held at Picton last week. He was appointed Vice-President of the Association.

Mr. Jos. Calloway, of Winnipeg, is back on a visit. Mr. Calloway in an old Stanleyite, and is a brother of Alderman Calloway, of Winnipeg, who back in the seventies, took an active part in some of the election campaigns of South Huron.

Mr. Alexander Nicol, of the 6th line of Morris, has purchased from his neighbor, Mr. M. Q. Strick, his farm of 100 acres for the sum of \$4,750. Mr. Nicol has now 300 acres of first-class land, all on the 6th line of Morris.

John McMillan, M. P. for South Huron, has been attending Exeter's Institutes during the past two weeks in the counties of Wentworth and Brant in company with Professor Pantou, of the Ontario Agricultural College.

On Sunday morning, at Christ Church, London, in the presence of a numerous congregation, the Right Rev. Bishop of Huron ordained to the deaconate Mr. H. Bray, of Huron College, (formerly of Clinton) and to the priesthood the Rev. T. A. Wright, of Gorrie.

Wm. Stewart, of the 8th con., Hullett, lost a splendid mare, one day last week. He had been feeding her on cut straw and meal, and she took sick and died the next day. A neighbor was about to buy her at \$200.

While driving home from the country on Wednesday of last week, Mr. Frank Ruse, Exeter, met with an accident. The axle of his buggy broke and he was thrown on his head, which received several cuts. The horse broke loose and ran into town. It was caught and put in the Central Livery for the night, but was restored to its owner in the morning.

Mr. John Tamblin, of the 13th con., has just completed a very handsome residence on his farm, with all the modern improvements, being heated with hot air; a grand improvement on the manner of heating a house forty years ago, with a big fire place and nearly a half a cord of wood burning at a time. Mr. Tamblin did not build the house before he needed it. They had the pleasure of taking their Christmas dinner in their new house. May they long live to enjoy it.

A few days ago Mrs. P. P. Simmons, of Wingham, had a stroke of paralysis from the effects of which she died and was buried Friday. Her funeral cortege had only returned from laying her remains in the grave when her husband breathed his last, having been struck down with paralysis of the brain. The aged couple, who were highly respectable people, never full recovered from the effects of the stroke caused by the hanging of their son, Ben, in London, about two years ago, for the murder of his paramour.

At a wood bee held on the farm of Mr. Wilson Armstrong, Goshen line, recently, W. H. Stephenson and Samuel Johnston cut a log 16 1/2 inches in diameter inside the bark in 39 seconds. The same work was also done in the same time by Robert Nicholson and William Armstrong. The two latter also cut one log 15 inches in diameter in 28 seconds.

Mr. William Sprout has sold his farm on the Kippen road, Tuckermith, to Mr. H. M. Chesney for the sum of \$7,500. The farm contains one hundred acres, is pleasantly located, has good buildings and is in good condition. Mr. Sprout intends retiring from farming and will move to Seaford where he hopes to gain a well earned rest. Mr. Chesney, we believe, has purchased the farm for one of his sons. Such a place is not by any means a bad "setting out" for a young man.

Mr. John Reith, Blake, has returned from the old country. This was Mr. Reith's first trip across the Atlantic and of course he enjoyed his visit, although he combined business with pleasure. He took over about 1,100 barrels of apples with him, and disposed of them very satisfactorily. He brought back with him two very fine three-year-old Clydesdale mares and one young stallion.

Mr. W. Z. Watts, Worcester, left this week for Mount Forest, having disposed of his furniture factory and undertaking business to Messrs Smith Bros. & Malcolm, of Brussels. The clerk was instructed to write Joseph Heatherington, secretary of S. S. No. 5 to return \$5.40 of taxes in error of property being rated in S. S. No. 5, instead of S. S. No. 6. Bylaw No. 1 for 1889, was read as per statute and passed. The board disapproved to a certain extent of S. S. No. 9 debenture and left the matter to the reeves to make different arrangements if agreeable. The clerk was instructed to notify the auditors to meet at the township hall on Friday, Feb. 1st, at 10 o'clock. The council adjourned to meet on Feb. 1st, at 10 o'clock sharp.
