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

enough comfortably to contain four patients at the same time. The treatment is chiefly used for patients suffering from asthma, bronchitis and emphysema. During the treatment, which lasts two hours, the patients may play cards or draughts or read, though general conversation is forbidden as being too tiring. The patient walks in through a heavy iron door, which is then closed and sealed. Air is then

pumped in gradually by means of a steam pump until the pressure is about 25 lbs. to the square inch, or two-thirds of an atmosphere above the normal. After being kept at this height for an hour the air is gradually allowed to escape, the reduction taking about half an hour. There are numerous heavy plate glass portholes in the walls through which the attendants

can observe the patients inside. "The effect obtained," the attendant in charge of the apparatus explained. "is practically that of breathing condensed air. A course consists of about twenty-five baths, three a week being the rule. Whether the increased air pressure really expands the tiny tubes and dir cells in the lungs, or whether the benefit is derived from the increased oxygen absorbed from the denser air, many patients are undoubtedly helped by the treatment. One private asthma patient has come up from Yorkshire regularly every season for many years to take a course of the baths. He says they set him up for the whole year."
