Training of Teachers.

On the invitation of Mr. Blackall, B. A., Superintendent of C. E. School Education, a number of gentlemen this morning attended the teachers' training class conducted by Mr. Barnes in a room in the British Hall. The class consists of a number of youths and maidens, from 16 to 20 years. The recitation this morning consisted of the discussion by members of the class at the suggestion of Mr. Barnes, of the type of children, training of the senses, the holding of attention, the utilization of the motor powers of the child, methods of teaching, etc. At the close of the discussion, remarks of an appreciative character were made by Supt. Blackall, Premier Morris, Rev. G. Bolt, Mr. J. Withers, Hon. J. Harvey and Mr. W. F. Lloyd.

The most remarkable feature of the exercise was the comparative ease and familiarity with which these young people after a course of three months discussed the bearing of physiology and psychology on school training of children.

The Premier offered a gold medal to the one who had made most progress in the class. The award to rest with the class. He also offered another medal for next year.

Charivaria.
