Marconi's Experiments

Elsewhere in this issue will be found a reprint of letter number IV, which Archbishop Howley contributed to the Evening Telegram on January 15th, 1902. His Grace contended that Marconi must eventually make Newfoundland his stepping stone to bridge the Atlantic by wireless telegraphy. The grounds of contention were that the arc between Avalon and the Lizard had no land intervening, whereas no arc can be set from the Lizard to any point of land from the Gulf of St. Lawrence and North Florida which does not pass through Newfoundland. That the intervening land would deflect, dissipate or in some ways and at some times interrupt wireless communication between the Lizard and a station on the coast line under reference, and that the route between the Lizard and Avalon would be free from such interruption and would have the further advantage of being shorter and more effective as a receiving and sending station under the well known law of physics that electric power decreases in effectiveness inversely with the square of the distance. To illustrate: If the distance is doubled, the effectiveness is decreased fourfold.

In the football match the Ferryland and Caplin Bay men beat a mixed team from the line by 3 goals to nil.

Cattle Ship Arrives.

The schr. Gladys E. W. Whidden, Capt. Hilton, arrived here to-day from Port Mulgrave to J. & W. Pitts, with 102 head of cattle, 102 sheep, 5 horses and general cargo. The vessel had a very stormy run, had to put into Louisburg, Thursday morning, and after leaving had gales of S. W. wind with a heavy sea which lasted until yesterday.

Coal Trimmer Was Suffocated.

Hungarian Lost His Life at the Sydney Steel Plant.

Sydney, Aug. 27.—A Hungarian, Pedro Sgestobus, a coal trimmer at the steel plant, fell through the hatch of a car which was loaded with coke breeze yesterday, and before his companions could reach him he was smothered to death. His body was almost completely buried in the fine dust, and only his legs protruded. He was noticed falling by another Hungarian, and though he told some men near him, they could not understand the language, and he ran to another Hungarian, and together they pulled the unfortunate man out. At the inquest it transpired that Pedro had no reason to be near the car as he was not employed there. A verdict of accidental death by suffocation was returned.
