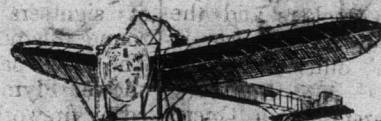

## Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day.

It is reported at Sofia that Serbia has yielded to the exhortation of Russia and the Powers to accept Russian arbitration on the basis of the ante-Bellum treaty. This has not yet been confirmed from Belgrade where a Cabinet crisis, which arose through the Ministers of war and Justice refusing to consent to such course and still continues. It is rumored a new Cabinet will be formed by Mr. Radoslovich, Minister of the Interior of the previous Cabinet, who is strongly anti-Bulgarian.

LONDON, To-day.

St. Petersburg dispatch to the Standard says President Woodrow Wilson has declined Russia's request for a renewal of the treaty of Commerce, except on the absolute conditions that American Jews are allowed to enter Russia freely.

CALGARY, ALB., To-day.

Arthur Pelkey, pugilist was acquitted of manslaughter, on a charge placed against him as a result of the Luther-McCarthy bout, who died on the first round of a ten round bout here to-day.

CHERBOURG, To-day.

While the forts were firing a salute in honor of the arrival of President Poincaré on his way to England yesterday afternoon, an explosion occurred, which resulted in the death of two men, of the serious wounding of four others. The Lieutenant in charge of the section has been placed under close arrest. President Poincaré desired to cancel a dinner party aboard the Courbet and the fete in the harbor, but the guests were already arriving.

## New Party for Women

It is proposed to form the "Women's Municipal Party," with the purpose of making effective use of the women's vote in local elections, and when occasion offers, enabling a fair number of women candidates to be put forward on non-party lines.

The idea has been very favorably received by many prominent people, and the promoters hope that the movement will have an important effect in securing the direct participation of women in those branches of municipal work for which they have all the necessary qualifications. A representative committee will shortly be formed to nominate candidates at municipal elections, and when necessary, to help to defray their expenses.—Daily Graphic.

## Invermore Here

Despatched to Bring Up Home. The S. S. Invermore, Capt. Jacob Kean, arrived here at 2 a.m. to-day from the Labrador and all things considered made a good run up and down the coast to Black Tickle. The ship met a deal of ice and did well to get down so far. She brought up a few passengers and left again this morning, to tow the Home here from Nipper's Harbour.

One of the largest lobsters possibly ever seen in the city was brought here from Portugal Cove by W. D. Rose, who caught it yesterday. It was brought to Geo. M. Barry's and measured 23 inches in length from the tip of the claw to the tip of the tail.

## Detained by Ice.

and a number of icebergs. It is an  
unusual occurrence for a coastal  
steamer to be icebound at Twillingate  
during the summer season.

## Detectives on Trail.

Jackson, Miss., June 18.—Burns  
detectives and others employed by  
Governor Brewer, to investigate al-  
leged graft in Mississippi, said the  
State has been robbed of half a mil-  
lion dollars and that the swindlers  
extends over a period of four years.  
The chief loss is through institu-  
tional officials selling live-stock and  
crops and making no report.  
The probe's task is difficult, be-  
cause many account books and re-  
cords were stolen. At least three  
arrests before the week end are pre-  
dicted.

So soon for ever shattered!

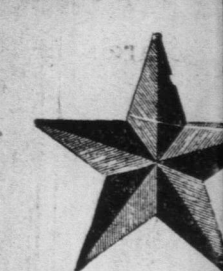
## Absentmindedness.

The Newfoundland Government ap-  
pears to be suffering from a fit of  
absentmindedness. A British salvage  
firm has sent a powerful plant in or-  
der to float the steamer Glace Bay,  
which lies aground off the Newfound-  
land coast. But the Government have  
demanded duties on all the material  
to be used on the job of no less an  
amount than 35 per cent. A more  
absurd imposition could not be im-  
agined. If the demand is persisted in,  
the only possible result will be that  
shippers will refuse to take the risks  
of trading to Newfoundland at all.  
Indeed, the premiums required by  
underwriters would render it impos-  
sible for them to do so. As New-  
foundland does not produce salvage  
plant, there can be no question of  
protecting home industries, while, as  
for the revenue to be derived from  
such a source, for every pound re-  
ceived the Government stands to lose  
a thousand by the raffing off of trade  
which would inevitably follow. We  
hope Sir Edward Morris and his Min-  
isters will bethink themselves.—Pati-  
Gazette, May 25th, 1913.
