Naval Activity.

News comes to-day of naval activity in far distant seas. The Emden, a German cruiser of 3952 tons, launched guns, has been making havoc of British shipping in the Bay of Bengal and was reported a week ago off Rangoon, the chief port of Burmah. From the other side of the Indian Ocean, comes the news that a British cruiser, the Pegasus, completed in 1898, of 2135 tons and carrying eight 4 inch guns was caught in Zanzibar by the Koenigsburg, while overhauling her machinery, and was demolished. Against that the Carmania, an auxiliary merchant cruiser caught a German merchant cruiser off the coast of South America and destroyed her. Now comes the news that the French have brought up their heavy artillery to cope with those of the Germans. The battle those of the Germans. The battle tion of the German lines has been principally a frontal battle, and the cost in blood must have been heavy. The little news we received last week speak of the carnage as being more terrible than on the banks of the Marne. One correspondent speaks of the Valley of the Aisne as the Valley of Death. The Germans are reported to be getting exhausted, and it is hoped that the battle will yet be turned into a great victory for the Allies. At present both sides are still holding much the same ground as they were a week ago. But the splendid courage of the British and the grand work of the French, give hope that the Germans may yet be driven back.



OFFICIAL NEWS.

The following official bulletin was posted at St. Pierre to-day:-On the left wing north of the Aisne egion, at Soissons, owing to violent ounter attacks dealt by superior German forces, the French were compelled to draw back slightly for a while but recovered the lost ground on the right bank of the Aisne. Progress or right bank of the Aisne. Progress on our side is continual, and north of Reims vigorous German attacks were equally repulsed. Another standard has been taken from a German regiment in the centre. East of Reims our troops also repulsed attacks and advanced in the region of Argonne. The hills situation remains unchanged. In Woevre, owing to heavy rains and swamping ground, operations are exceedingly difficult. General de Maudhilly was decorated on the battlefield.
