Capt. P. Otterson Reaches the City.

WAS A PRISONER IN GERMANY. By yesterday's express Capt. Peter Otterson, navigator of the ill-fated schooner Duchess of Cornwall, which was sunk by a German raider, reached the city. The Duchess of Cornwall a cargo of 4,000 qtls. of Labrador codfish and was to proceed to Gibraltar for orders, but four days after leaving port fell a victim to the raider when about 800 miles south of Cape Race. About 7 o'clock in the morning of December 8th a strange ship hove in sight, which was taken for a tramp bound westward. The Duchess of Cornwall was making good progress under a favourable wind when the approaching steamer bore down upon her and ordered the captain to heave his ship to. This being done, an officer with sixteen men fully armed came on board, and demanded the ship's papers, which were handed him by Cant. Thos. Gunnery. The nature of her cargo and her British register were all the Huns required. The crew were given fifteen minutes to clear out of the ship and get on board the raider. A bomb was placed in the cabin and two others over the side of the ship. The officer lit the fuse and in less than a few minutes there was a loud explosion and twenty

minutes after the ship went under with all her light canvas set.

On reaching the raider, whose name could not be discovered, Capt. Otterson and crew were ordered to keep below decks, and in company with the crews of three steamers which had met a similar fate to the Duchess of Cornwall. For five days the men were confined in a small compartment barely large enough to accommodate ten men, the conditions being terrible. The unfortunate sailors were then transferred to the Yarrowdale, which was seized while en route from New York to Havre with a general cargo. On board the latter ship were 500 sailors comprising the crews of a number of ships sent to bottom by the pirate. The prisoners were not allowed the slightest freedom, being under an armed guard and forced to stay below deck. There was only one cook on board the Yarrowdale to prepare food for 500 men. Eighteen days after boarding the latter ship Capt. Otterson reached Swinemunde, where the prisoners were confined to barracks for five days. From there they were placed in trains and taken to Newsterlitz, in the centre of Germany, and were again put in barracks, which had recently been erected with accomodation for 5,000. Here again the victims suffered untold hunger, being allowed practically nothing but bad bread and water, but were not asked

o work. Capt. Otterson, who claimed his liberty as a Norwegian citizen, was released on Jan. 27th and with 23 of his countrymen and 3 Americans was sent to Copenhagen. From there he wired the shipowners here of the loss of their ship as previously published in the Telegram. He then proceeded to Bergen where he remained for a fertnight. Obtaining permission from the British Consul he joined a freight boat and crossed over to Hull. Reporting at the Board of Trade he was given a passage to Liverpool, joined ar. Allan Liner for St. John, N.B., and from there reached the city via Louis-

The remainder of the crew of the Duchess of Cornwall, who are still confined at Newsterlitz Barracks, are Capt. Thos. Gunnery, George Grant, Isaac Anderson, Arthur Barter and Alfred Anderson, all natives of Burgeo, Nfld. The condition of food stuffs in Germany as seen by Capt. Otterson, and the scant supply that is doled out to prisoners of war, all go to prove that Germany is on the verge of a big uprising by her own people, and at any moment a revolution of not so mild a nature as that which occurred in Russia may be put in motion.
