What a lot we can learn from people, — if we will!

Long, long ago (I wonder if there is a reader friend who still remembers it) I wrote a little talk on the value of a bad example.

One learns as much, I stated, from the bad example as from the good. I have revised that opinion. I think one learns more,—at least about small faults.

Of course, a good example is a wonderful influence. It gives us large ideals of character building. It fires us with high enthusiasm. But to help us detect small faults, unpleasant mannerisms, offenses against good taste, I think there is no force so powerful as the bad example.

Hitch This Force Up.

Of course this force has to be hitched up to the habit of self-analysis. Otherwise it is as useless as a pulley without a belt.

But once get the power transmitted to the right place, and what a lot of good it can do! In almost all the people you know, no matter how much you like them, you are apt to find some small faults.

Now, which of these faults do others see in you?

You Feel As If You Should Scream.

This friend, talks too much. Most of what she says is interesting, but there is too much of it. You feel as if you should scream, sometimes, if she doesn't keep still.

(Sometimes people have seemed unresponsive when you have been saying things you were sure were interesting. Can it be they were tired?)

That one, has a way of nagging you to do things. Usually things you ought to do,—and probably would do, in your own good time. But her importunities create an extraordinary obstinacy in you.

THE FEET IN WARM WEATHER.

Your feet should be bathed twice a day in warm weather and as summer comes on, three times a day is not too often. Fresh hosiery should be donned every day. There is no excuse for excessive perspiration of the feet for at small cost one may purchase powders or a prescription that will cure the annoyance. One of the best things is one grain of permanganate of potash and one ounce of distilled water, applied with a soft gauze after the foot bath night and morning.

When you are bathing your feet you should bear in mind that you must relax all the muscles and blood vessels, and for that reason you must not subject the feet to great or sudden changes of temperature. A splendid tonic bath for tired and aching feet may be taken by adding to the usual foot bath of hot water, one ounce of green soap. Dip your feet up and down in the water until free from soap. In drying be sure to dry thoroughly in between the toes, as it is moisture between the toes that causes soft corns.

Callouses of the sole and heel are often painful and sometimes really cripple the sufferer. Frequent bathing and rubbing often suffices to keep these formations from being troublesome. A smooth piece of pumice stone may be used to shave off the thickened skin. Before applying either of these remedies it is well to apply cold cream to the sore spots.

The securing of help and other manure and fertilizers are necessary, and in order to secure this, men spend weeks of spare time previous to actual planting and sowing, in securing manure, and in many cases in this district the after-noon farmer is limited in his planting to the amount of manure he is able to secure. April 1st to April 10th is late enough for the old time, if the great benefit to production of food is to be realized.

LONDON, Feb. 25, 1918.  
WALES IN THE HOUSE OF LORDS.

The Prince of Wales took his seat in the House of Lords on February 19th, and the general impression was that he looked and behaved exactly as a nice, shy, well-bred English boy should. Everybody took a kindly interest in his fair face and smooth-brushed hair as he walked between his sponsors, the Duke of Norfolk and the Duke of Somerset. He spoke in a clear, youthful voice, without mumbling or hesitation, when he took the oath of allegiance to his Royal father. As he put on his cocked hat and took his seat on the Prince of Wales' chair beside the throne it was noted in his favor that he blushed deeply. After sitting there for a moment or two he left the Chamber and went to the Moses Room to get rid of his scarlet robes and smoke a cigarette. After that he came back to the House in his khaki to listen to the debate for a while, and then went out to the tea-room, where he took tea and had a long chat with some Indian officers. The Queen was in the peeresses' gallery watching this family event with deep interest, and occasionally with signs of amiable nervousness. It may interest your women readers to know that she was dressed in black with a curl-brimmed black hat, trimmed with large black ostrich plumes, and wore a long brown fur stole and a large muff to match. It is of course well known that the Queen does not "follow the fashions."

## ABDUL HAMID'S GERMAN INVESTMENTS.

According to information which has reached an authoritative neutral quarter here from Bern the death of the ex-Sultan Abdul Hamid of Turkey has raised the question in Berlin as to what is to be done with, or more correctly, what has become of, the four million pounds (\$20,000,000) which was understood to be lying in certain German banks to the credit of the late monarch. After his deposition efforts were made to obtain the money for the successor to the throne, but various legal objections were brought forward by the bankers, and the question was still at issue when the war broke out. If the money be allowed now to go to Constantinople it may be considered certain to be coupled with conditions which would make the hold of Germany on the Porte even stronger than before.
