Halifax, September 22.—A cable to  
F. E. Furness advises him of the re-  
irement of Viscount Furness from the  
chairmanship of the Furness Withy  
Company and the associated shipping  
companies, and that Sir Frederick  
Lewis, deputy chairman, has become  
chairman. Lord Furness will devote  
himself to his steel, coal, shipbuilding  
and kindred interests.

Furness Withy and Company, Ltd.,  
have acquired the New York-Ber-  
muda line, formerly operated by the  
Quebec Steamship Company, and the  
Canada Steamship Lines, Limited.

Lord Furness will be at the head  
of the various subsidiaries of the Co.,  
such as shipbuilding, steel plants, coal  
mines and other kindred undertakings.  
He will devote all his energies to  
the development of these particular  
industries and will remain in close  
touch with the shipping interests in  
his way.

Editor Evening Telegram  
Dear Sir,—As your popular journal  
has been an avenue for the past forty  
years, in which the word "man" could  
at all times gain access to ventilate  
his grievances (and goodness knows  
they were many) I am sure you will  
grant me a small space to ask the Hon  
John Anderson the outstanding figure  
in the great Housing Scheme to make  
public in the interest of the tenants  
of this town the Act known as the  
Tenancy Bill which was passed at the  
last session of the Assembly. There  
are very few of us acquainted with the  
verbiage or wording of the Act, and  
the landlords seems to know less, be-  
cause rents are being raised in full  
defiance of that law and writs of  
eviction are being issued by the court  
just the same as the penal days in  
Ireland. What is the use of placing  
in the Statute Book if they are  
not being carried out? Half the house-  
es or wig-wams here in the West  
End are leaky, why doesn't the Coun-  
cil see the Law is carried out, when  
people make complaints, surely it is  
not on the square that the parents of  
those who did their bit on the North  
Sea and on various battlefields should  
be subjected to treatment like this.  
They went across, fought and con-  
quered, the Hun asst and ashore,  
to come back and fight profiteering  
Huns at home. As one of them aptly  
put it, we were heroes going over  
now we are Hoboes in the eyes of  
those for whom we risked life and  
limb so as they might continue to  
live in luxury. Mr. Editor, it seems  
that the worker in this city to-day  
is laboring from morn till night for  
the profiteers family and not his own.

eye of the Hon. John, I thank you in  
anticipation for publication.

The schooner Norman S. with 350  
qts. of codfish and the Reunion with  
150 qts. have returned to Trinity.

## Poultry Exhibition.

If a suitable Hall can be secured  
the Nfld. Poultry Association, will  
hold an exhibition this fall. The as-  
sociation met last night in the Board  
of Trade rooms. It was decided that,  
if a suitable place can be had, a show  
will be held during the last week of  
November, and that a Canadian judge  
would be brought here for the occa-  
sion. Next Monday the final decision  
will be arrived at, when it is hoped  
that everything will be favorable for  
holding the interesting event.

## Injured in a Cave In.

A resident of Baseline, named Le-  
grow, aged 15 years, had his leg frac-  
tured at that place on Friday last. It  
appears the lad was digging out road  
material from an old gravel pit, when  
without warning it caved in, burying  
him to the shoulders. Men working  
near soon extracted him, and upon ex-  
amination found, that besides receiv-  
ing a broken leg, that he was internal-  
ly injured. He was removed to hos-  
pital where he is doing well.
